## VANISHING SCHOOLS

The article from Harvey Road School has caused me to think back over my school career. I started School shortly before the Second World War began and attended Yorke Road School. My first teacher was Miss Bridge and it is now clear that this was her first class after qualification. My son went to Yorke Mead School and was there when she retired as Headmistress. Yorke Road School is still there but no longer a school, having been replaced by a more up-to-date building. I remember outside loos that froze in the Winter, roaring fires in large grates to heat the rooms and our third pint bottles of milk standing in the hearth to take off the freezing chill. I spent some happy vears there. Then I moved on to the fairly new wooden shack that was Harvey Road School. In the play area there was a least one underground air raid shelter and I remember singing lustily in the dimly lit shelter whilst enemy planes sported overhead. My other strong memories include the allotment gardens, how I hated them, and several teachers. Miss Kneale(?) who wielded a mighty slipper and have fondest memories of Miss Bardslev who believed in me when I had not yet learnt to believe in myself. Alleluia, the temporary wooden hut is no more and we now have a superb modern building. My memories remain.

I then went on, having surmounted the scholarship (11+) examination, to Watford Central School in Derby Road, now a primary school but then a Grammar School.

My sisters went to Durrants School which sadly has gone, but many former pupils still have happy memories of this truly local school.

During my adult years I have seen Malvern Way School, Little Green School and Rickmansworth School appear. They have all become part of our community but the fondest memories of my generation must be for Yorke Road, Harvey Road and Durrants.

All of us have memories and these should be recorded unless we forget and future generations are unaware of them. If you have any please contact Margaret Pomfret.

The Parish Bus has now been running for several years and is well supported. Though bus passes are not accepted, the return fare is less than concessionary fares and the bus goes to your door. Shopping is thus made easier for our senior citizens. Many friends are made on this service, not least between the volunteer conductors and the passengers.



## OLD GIRL IS NEW HEAD FOR NEW SCHOOL



The Children of Harvey Road School, Croxley Green, are now settling into the new purpose built building which replaced the wooden 'temporary hut' built in 1938.

However, there is another significant change at the school. Alison Gauntlett, who has been Acting Head since the retirement of Alan Nicholson, has just been appointed to the position full time.

Alison has a long association with the school, having attended Harvey Road before going on to Watford Girls. She came back to Harvey Road as a class teacher in 1988, becoming Deputy Head in 1991.

"Little did I imagine that when I left here as en eleven year old, I would eventually return and take the Headship! It is a very exciting time in the history of the school and I look forward to its continued development. One of the great strengths of the school is the strong community spirit which exists and I welcome the opportunity to be part of it"

Mr Alan Nicholson, who has been at Harvey Road School for 23 years, said: "I have been very fortunate, over the years, to have had wonderful colleagues who have been very loyal and supportive. I shall miss the contact with the children and the school community."

Mr Nicholson said he was promised a new school on his appointment, adding: "That was in 1975 and it has taken them 22 years to keep their promise. But I feel it is appropriate that I leave now as I feel part of the fittings."

Outside the classroom he is a keen singer and has been a member of the Cassio Operatic Society since 1962.

The governors wish Alan all the very best in his retirement.

He has served the Croxley Green community well for many years. We are all very grateful, particularly that he pushed so hard for the new school.

This is a very exciting time for the school. We are extremely pleased to have appointed someone with Alison's drive and commitment as Headteacher. She has always shown great ability and vision, and with a very strong team of staff, Harvey Road School is well set for the future.

## TAKING YOUR DOG FOR A WALK



During 1996 the Parish Council in line with many other local authorities throughout the country considered ways in which to encourage owners to clean up after their dogs, this was also in response to many residents who already actively removed "deposits" left by their pet and requested facilities to dispose of them.

A number of bins had already been provided and it was agreed to increase these and place extra bins in areas where it was felt they were needed. Poop Scoop bags were also made available FREE OF CHARGE from the Parish Office.

A poster competition involving local school children was very successful as part of this campaign and an extra prize was given for a winning slogan:

## "Even Good Dogs Need A Poop so Don't Leave Home Without Your Scoop"

Since this time the Council has made provision for even <u>more</u> Doggy Bins for your convenience (or your dogs!!) and have now for a trial period agreed with the Library to make available **FREE POOP SCOOP BAGS**.

## **BONFIRES**

These days Air Pollution is on most peoples minds. It is now possible to have recycling for most garden waste, by having an Earth Machine Compost Bin for recycling it should not be necessary to have garden bonfires at all.

This Summer has been very hot. having the air polluted by these nuisances could be a thing of the past. It is not very nice going to bed with your house filled with unwelcome smells. When the air is still, these smoky smells linger in the air for some hours, neighbours have to close windows and doors. That is not what you want when its very hot outside. Please always tell your neighbours if you intend to light They can be a bonfire. dangerous if unattended they problems can cause Asthmatics, Bronchitis sufferers and those with Heart problems and be a danger to small children and animals who hide in them.

Please consider recycling your waste at home and making compost - an Earth Machine Compost Bin can be obtained from Three Rivers District Council - telephone 01923 711318.

If you don't want to recycle garden refuse, green sacks are available at Croxley Green Library and Three Rivers House, Rickmansworth price 40p each. These sacks and labels should be deposited with your household refuge and will automatically be collected.

Just a few guidelines to remember on bonfires if you have to light one:

- Only burn dry material
- Never burn household rubbish, rubber tyres or anything containing plastic, foam or paint.
- Never use old engine oil, meths or petrol to light any fires or to encourage it.
- Avoid burning when the wind will carry the smoke into homes or over roads blocking out visibility.
- Avoid burning at all. Avoid when air quality is poor (you can get advice by phoning the Air Quality Information Service on 0800 556677 or checking on ceefax 196). Always put it out by dousing with water before you leave it Don't be a nuisance recycle it
