We meet for lunch periodically, which is fun and enables us to meet each other.

From The Chairman

Our Village Green has been used for special celebrations since before the turn of the century, and we have records of many regular events. Until more recent years the Green was used several times a year, not least for Cherry Sundays which occurred in the fruiting season. I can remember, as a boy, walking up the Green on a Sunday evening furnished with cherries from Stone's Orchard and casting the pits about me. It is a wonder that the Green did not become a cherry orchard in itself, there must have been tons of cherry pits cast upon its verdant stretches.

The annual Revels is recorded for many years, though we only have good records since 1951, when the Festival of Britain was a cause for revival. It was called the Revels because originally it was held on May Day. Doubtful weather caused its moving to the nearest Saturday to the longest day and, despite folk lore to the contrary, it is generally reasonable weather.

The Parish Council feels strongly

that the Green should be used more often and consequently we instituted the annual Picnic Funday in early July. In its third year we trust that it will continue to grow and become as well known as the Revels. It was on Sunday July 19th this year. We took a chance with the annual motor cycle rally and, despite early fears. this has proved popular and the bikers have proved to very responsible. However, this is not locally organised and we need more local events. This is especially important as the alternative village centre, the old Guildhouse is no more, a sad consequence of fire and the loss of John Dickinsons.

We have decided to be more ambitious this year and so, for more than a year, we have been planning an inaugural Craft Fair. This is no small undertaking and requires much organisation. The response from professional exhibitors has been very good and local amateur groups and exhibitors have shown their confidence with their eager response. However, this is only a start.

I cannot begin to describe the attractions available but others. more qualified, have set out their store in the pages of this special edition. Be assured, there will be something for everyone. Unfortunately it cannot be free, it is a costly venture, but the cost is modest for the amount of entertainment and interest that it will generate. I am mindful that the organisers of the Canal Festival in Rickmansworth must have been worried when they found out the cost of their new venture but, with good public support, they achieved their goal, people enjoyed the event, and it has become an annual fixture appreciated by many people.

Please give us a try. With your support, it is hoped that we shall be able to continue this Craft Fair as an annual event which should enhance the attraction of our heritage, a marvellous Village Green available for all.

THE CRAFT FAIR

To further utilise The Green the Council intends to initiate a second annual event, to take place over two days and to be called the "Croxley Green Craft Fair" with the inaugural event taking place on the 19/20 September 1998. There will be 3 x 100' X 50' marquees.

The first marquee will be exclusively for the use of professional craft exhibitors. There are 45 spaces which will be open from 10.00am to 6.00pm on Saturday and from 10.00am to 5.00pm on Sunday.

The second Marquee, from 10.00am to 6.00pm on Saturday will be available for local organisations/ individuals to exhibit and in the evening it will be used for entertainment in the event of inclement weather. From 10.00am to 5.00pm on Sunday it will contain more local organisations/individuals and a painting competition.

The third Marquee will be used as a restaurant for rest and relaxation and, in the event of inclement weather, will hold the evenings entertainment.

On Saturday evening there will be live bands playing, a pig roast, barbecue and bar facilities.

THE ORIGIN

Birth of an Idea

The germ of an idea, to hold a Craft Fair, originated two years ago whilst enjoying a similar event, with entertainment, in Guernsey. Through the last 12 months the structure of our event has been developed by your Parish Councillors who, together with local residents, have made it into a joint venture where all can participate showing examples of their own hobbies and crafts.

The balance of having a marquee devoted to a cross section of profession

crafts supporting a further marquee which has been made available to local organisations or individuals who wish to demonstrate their crafts will, hopefully, add a more interesting spectrum to the weekend.

The event is to show all visitors what alternative activities are going on behind the scenes in our community. Many of these associations or groups welcome residents who would be interested in trying their craft.

The daily events will also be supported by music and drama activities and in-house catering will be available to suit all needs and, during the Saturday evening, the light entertainment will continue with a barbecue roast. On Saturday the Horticultural Society will be holding a demonstration of their produce whilst on Sunday the Allotment Association and West Herts Beekeepers will be demonstrating whilst holding their annual prize giving produce shows.



- 9. Contravention of any rules will result in disqualification.





SAFE

BARBECUEING As the summer season settles in and the days and evenings get warmer, a strange primal urge will come upon the

men folk of the community.

This urge will be, to abandon the relative convenience (and often technological) comfort of the modern kitchen, take up the spatula and tongs, and cook over the open flame of a barbecue in the open air.

This urge often grips myself, especially on warm summer evenings, on the patio, after the children have spent most of the day in the paddling pool.

The point I would like to make is one of Fire Safety.

Many people each year are severely burned by barbecues, and some are even killed.

The first danger area is in lighting the barbecue.

There are plenty of ways of doing this safely, these include;

Using solid fire lighters – these are very effective. Remember to read the instructions.

Use of the bags of barbecue fuel that come in a brown oily paper type bag, which acts as the lighting medium – also very effective.

Using barbecue lighting fluid – follow the instructions, use plenty before lighting, but remember, NEVER squirt the fluid on the barbecue once it has been lit.

(A handy tip from my Station Commander is to cover the bottom of an old metal bucket in about one centimetre of barbecue lighter fluid, add your charcoal and cover for a couple of hours. When you come to use this charcoal it will be impregnated with the fluid, and should ignite easily!)

And for an economical/re-cycling method, old newspaper tightly folded into strips and then twisted into fire lighters can be just as effective.

Petrol should NEVER be used, in any way at all, to light barbecues.

It has an extremely low flash-point, and gives off potentially explosive vapours even on a cold day.

It should be remembered that many people every year are severely injured through the misuse of petroleum spirit.

It is very unforgiving if used for any purpose other than the job that it is designed to do. (And that is to fuel internal combustion engines!)

Locate your barbecue away from any potentially combustible materials, but also away from the path of speeding children, (and, perhaps, tipsy adults).

Your barbecue should not be 'flaming' when you cook. The coals should appear 'greyish' radiating a lot of heat.

Cooking fatty foods may cause the barbecue to 'flame up' as the fat drips onto the coals and ignites.

You can control this by dousing the flames a little with an 'atomising' water spray, the sort you might use to spray leaves of house plants, but ensure that it is clean! (I have a friend that fills his spray with beer, insisting that it improves the flavour of the food!)

And finally, keep a bucket of water handy, not only for if your fire gets out of control, but the best treatment for burnt fingers or hands is to plunge them into cool water. It may seem like overkill, but what harm can it do? After all, accidents can happen to any of us, surely it is best to be prepared.
