FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Like the start of an academic year, so the Parish Council is reforming after the May elections. Before endorsing the new council may I thank all past councillors who, for personal or business commitments, decided to retire after the previous four year session. They will be duly missed both for their contributions to the well running of the council and their involvement in the community. Many thanks for your many hours of participation.

With the restructuring of the Ward boundaries within Croxley Green, prospective Parish Council candidates within the North and South Wards found that they did not have to go to the electorate due to limited representation whilst Croxlev Green Ward was contested by seven candidates for six seats. Now that the elections have passed the all important task of enrolling the candidates has taken place and the panel of members now forming the council is comprised of re-elected council members with previous service, who bring their experience, together with new council members who bring an injection of new ideas and opinions. This all lends itself to a favourable council chamber and we welcome all members.

As the dust died down on community elections so within the Council the election of chairman and committee chairmen had to be performed so that the new Council could proceed with any formal business.

With a change in the Parish Council chairman, on behalf of the past and incumbent Council, I would like to thank our past chairman Councillor John Hedges for his valiant work and guidance over the past seven

years which has put the present council on firm foundations. Cllr Hedges has now taken on the task of being chairman of the Planning and Development Committee with the support of Cllr Wynne-Jones as vice-chairman

The Environment and Amenity Committee is being chaired by Cllr Margaret Pomfret, supported by Cllr Christine Jefford.

These two committees cover the main objectives of the Parish Council's work within the community whilst the vice-chairman, Cllr Tim Davis, and myself - Cllr Brian Norman oversee the day to day workings of the chamber, ably assisted by Derek Fineberg our all important Parish Clerk.

As with the previous Council, Councillors continue to participate in supportive offices within the community such as school governors or members of one of the many social or leisure organisations in the village, thereby harmonising a two-way communication between this community's grass roots and your local government body so that hopefully there can be a free flow of productive ideas and comments.

I look forward to serving all in Croxley Green in my new capacity.

DON'T TURN A BLIND EYE TO THE DANGERS OF THE ECLIPSE

In Cornwall, shortly after 11.00 on the morning of August 11 this year, there will be a total eclipse of the sun. In Croxley Green, there will be a partial eclipse of the sun lasting less than one hour. In that time you could damage your eyes irrevocably by viewing the eclipse directly.

WHAT IS UNSAFE

Do not use any visual aid to reduce the brightness as there are very few that are completely effective in cutting out sufficient solar radiation. **DO NOT LOOK THROUGH** sunglasses, smoked glass, binoculars, telescopes, cameras, or photographic film. Even special filters from astronomical suppliers may be unsafe because a small imperfection may allow damaging radiation through which could burn the retina. The absorption of a filter to be safe needs to cut out 99.999% of light. If it cuts out only 99.99% it is unsafe.

Children are particularly vulnerable to the dangers of the eclipse because they will naturally want to look up at the sun when the unusual effect is going on and not realise the damage that could be done.

WHAT IS SAFE

The safest way to view the eclipse of the sun is by means of **PROJECTION**. Either using binoculars or a pinhole in a piece of card, **project the image** of **the eclipse** on to a card held behind. Or just watch it on television.

Have you ever been on holiday to Highcliffe or Christchurch in Dorset? Well it's a pleasure to visit, the Council there prides itself on the Floral displays. Gardens are full of flowers even on the top of bus shelters. Hanging baskets galore. Well after a bit of research from the Council of the area we have put into our budget a small sum of money to enable Croxley Green to have a few floral areas. Cllr Brian Norman and myself did some research on the five shopping areas and decided; that we would like to bring to the council our proposals.

When people emerge from the station their first impressions always stay, the area from the station up Watford Road will have Hanging Baskets from the Lamps, probably five in all. The first shopping area we felt that would be a good site, where the shops near to the ideal spots have been consulted, would be Baldwins Lane, Two Bridges end. There are possible sites, tidying up the grassed area would be the first project. There are two types of Planters which would be self watering on a tier in threes, or one larger style. Of course this may not take place straight away but we have support from D&J Nurseries who have been interested to help with the project if we need them. Also a company who deals with council floral displays who rent them seasonally, which are already prepared.

This project was to be my last as I have now stood down from the council, and I wish the new council every success with the venture when and if it goes ahead.



Croxley Common Moor in May and June

One of the pleasures of living near the canal in South Croxley is that within five minutes walk I can find myself wandering through the midst of unspoilt pristine moorland. Yes, with a bit of imagination one could be somewhere in Dorset or Devon. so varied are the flowering plants and bushes. There is heather, whin, gorse and blackthorn to delight the eye and to provide the flowers for the hosts of buzzing insects particularly butterflies that feed upon them. There are, among the plants, harebell, flag, cow parsley (old maids lace), iris and betony to name but a few - all growing just as nature intended them to, long before the advent our new 'chemical countryside' so beloved by modern farmers in their never ending

Yes, our Common Moor, with its good old fashioned flower bedecked pastureland takes me back to those far off days when I was a child, when the miracle of Spring was celebrated each year by myriads of flowers in every corner of our green and

pleasant land. Before selective weed killers were invented the countryside used to be a much more interesting place to roam in Spring there was a deafening dawn chorus unlike the ragged one of today and birds' nests everywhere destroyed by the huge increase magpies, squirrels and predatory cats that we now That is why Sites of special Scientific Interest like our Moor are of such value for it is there, on a clear May evening, that one can sample the unspoilt pleasure of 'nature in action' as it was in days of old.

One used to hear the cuckoo everywhere – not so today, but in May, on Common Moor the delightful call of this very English bird, floats everywhere through the clear Spring air. Swifts screech overhead, pheasants call, the green Woodpecker zips from anthill to anthill. The melodious songs of the whinchat, reed warbler and, above all, the goldfinch mingle in a rich magical chorus.

There are birds breeding on the Moor, at least one pair of partridges, meadowpipits, long tailed tits, kingfishers and sparrow hawks to name but a few. That is why it is important to keep to the paths in the nesting season.

This magical mosaic of natural wonder has somehow survived the centuries and is another reason why we should be so proud of Croxley Green – let us never forget that. As far as quality of life goes, we have won the real lottery and it is up to each of us to see that we do our best to keep it that way. For those who want to travel on the Moor there is a very good leaflet available free of charge from the Parish Office and the Library.

£100 REWARD

Help stop fly tipping spoiling our Parish.

If you walk or drive through Croxley Hall Woods at the moment it would be difficult not to notice the awful mess left by builders spoil and tree cuttings.

To combat these loads being indiscriminately dumped Three Rivers District Council is to introduce a reward scheme to encourage the reporting of tipping. A reward of £100 will be offered for information which results in a successful criminal prosecution and a 24 hour telephone hotline number has been set up.

Did you know fly tipping is punishable by a fine of up to £2,500 and/or three months in prison.

The cost of clearing and disposal of lorry loads of spoil can be as much as £250 a time, depending on the type of material tipped.
