EDITORIAL

The Parish Council has been going through a certain amount of difficulties lately. There was an election in October to replace seven Parish Councillors who resigned. Six Councillors resigned at one time giving a variety of reasons for their departure. The remaining nine Councillors did not feel it incumbent to resign as they had not supported the views of those who took such drastic action and felt that it was their duty to continue to serve their constituents in the positions to which they had been elected. They have now been joined by six others who were successful in the elections or were elected unopposed. The new councillors are very welcome. One vacancy still exists as there was no candidate for the North ward.

It was disappointing that so few people bothered to vote, some 12.6%, when so many had signed the petition that was generated by an ad hoc group.

In response to that petition, and in order to clear the air, an investigation has been ordered by the Parish Council into its workings. The Councillors who stayed, a majority, are fully supportive of this action and will cooperate with the enquiry, being prepared to stand up and be counted. The results of that investigation will be reported in full.

Hopefully, following that investigation, and with new members to complete the full complement of your elected representatives, the matter will be consigned to the archives and the Parish Council will be free to serve the community which they love. It must be remembered that all Councillors are unpaid volunteers and give of their time freely.

It has been alleged that the Parish Council is not open but all our meetings are open to the public, there are no secret meetings except when staff matters are to be discussed, and all minutes/agendas are published and available for inspection at the Library.

I was elected to fill the void left by the resignation of the Chairman and Adrian Simpson was elected as Vice Chairman. We will endeavour to do all within our power to ensure the smooth working of the Council.

This Newsletter is an exercise in letting people know what is happening in the Council and our community. From the comments that I receive, and I have been Editor since its inception, I know that it is appreciated. We can, like the Croxley Green Resident, only print copy that is supplied to us but we try to be as catholic as possible. If you have news that is worth relaying to the public at large we shall be pleased to hear from you.

As a Parish Council, we are limited in our powers, but we genuinely try to serve the community as best we can. We are convinced that Croxley Green is the better for our humble efforts and that value for money is maintained. We are often accused of concentrating our efforts on the Green and we do in fact maintain important centre this of OUL community. However, inconsiderable amount of work is carried out around the village, not least on footpaths and other local amenities. Our Land Rover with its Rangers, can be found at all points around the village working to maintain our environment.

We are not devoid of ideas but, should you have particular concerns with which we can help, please do not hesitate to contact the Parish Office. If we cannot comply with your request, we can usually pass your concern to the relevant body or Local Authority. Remember, some take time and, things more importantly, money. We have to budget ahead and usually this is done in the latter part of the year ready for the next year which starts in April. This is often frustrating for Councillors who would wish to proceed with new initiatives as soon as possible.

Please think of us and wish us well as we try to serve you.

COMMUNITY LIFE

Do you ever get the feeling that people are not so interested in one another as they used to be? Fewer volunteers to be leaders in the Boy Scouts or Girl Guides, fewer people going to church, fewer people taking part in local affairs.

Of course, we are all so busy surfing the Internet, shopping as if there's no tomorrow, sending e-mail messages here, there and everywhere, and yes, working very long hours. It was all supposed to be so different – the machines would do the work, we would have more leisure time and above all, we would have time to indulge our hobbies, passions and enjoy our community. Alas, things never turn out as one expects and our lives in the twenty first century are no exception.

Our own Croxley Green is an example of this. There are so many able, gifted people living here, yet persuading anyone to be a youth leader, a neighbourhood watch volunteer or even a Parish Councillor is very difficult.

Croxley Green Parish Council recently had an election and one would think that many people would jump at this opportunity of helping to take an ac-



tive part in decisions that affect their village but that was not the case. It was with the greatest difficulty that one or two people were persuaded to stand and yet quite a few people had strong ideas about how the Council should be run. Why didn't one or two of them come for-

ward with their ideas? We need them.

Less and less people are voting in general elections, particularly young people – this is a serious problem for a democracy like ours. Apathy rules, public servants are seen as irrelevant – it is so much easier to criticise than to be involved. With luck this attitude will change but it would be a good thing to remember the famous phrase 'Strong democratic administrations cannot survive without active positive public interest.'

COMMITTEES

Let's face it – being a member of a Planning Committee is not exactly most people's idea of an interesting way to spend their evening. Nevertheless, it is an important one inasmuch as the decisions taken at these 'dry as dust' meetings are vital for the future appearance of Croxley Green.

Because our area is such a pleasant one and above all, because we are able to offer a country atmosphere combined with superb road networks, train systems and a major airport, many people want to live here. The result of a successful planning application can result in hundreds of thousands, even a million pounds or more, profit for opportunistic individual 'entrepreneurs', not to mention the huge amounts for building companies, as those defending the OMT site have learned to their cost.

Many aspects of Croxley go back to when it was a quiet country village. The heart of the village around New Road and Dickinson Square go back to the horse and carriage era, which is why it is immensely hard to make any alteration whatsoever to cater for the flood of cars that now clog our streets. That is where your Planning Committee comes in, spending hours working out what is appropriate and what is not, before consulting you.

Again, on the other side of the medal, there are huge gardens attached to small houses, dating back to when the house owner grew all his own food. Today, each of these gardens are dormant goldmines, into which at least half a dozen new, smart buildings can be 'shoehorned'. For the future of our already clogged up streets, the Committee must laboriously discuss each and every one.

Then there are the bus stops, cycle racks, noticeboards, skate-boards, Christmas lighting and other innumerable small items that everyone takes for granted – dog bins being one of them. Hard work for a few dedicated Committee Members, expected as part of our famous 'quality of life' by everyone else.

A Parish Councillor is the lowest rung on the ladder of government and yet very many important planning requests start at this level. It's not a glamorous job but it is a responsible one – we welcome constructive criticism but remember, if you value your environment, we need your help and confidence to give us the motivation to do our very best for the privileged community who enjoy the amenities of our village.



CROXLEY COMMON MOOR

Although the autumnal shades are merging into the frosts of early winter, something is stirring on Croxley Common Moor.

For years this fascinating area of about one hundred acres on the borders of Croxley South was barely known about by most residents, although the grassy bank along the River Gade is still fondly remembered by many mature men and women as a place where young lads and lasses used to gather on long sunny evenings in the fifties and six-Muscular males displayed swimming and even diving skills in front of shapely young female spectators. In short, it was once a very romantic spot, when love life was so much more innocent and simple. I know two couples (still married and living in Croxley) who

first met at Canal Lock 79 – the 'Lido' of Croxley Green - and who regularly visit the spot to rekindle their romance. Things have changed since then, perhaps there is less romance but there are more rambling rural rustics. About five years ago we had the good fortune to have the Moor gazetted as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, managed by the Countryside Management Service.

About a year ago the 'Friends of Croxley Common Moor' were formed to help as volunteers, enhancing its beauty. There were sixty two members present at the first AGM in All Saints Church Hall in May and now we have a thriving active group which sets one Sunday a month aside to help in 'bush bashing', ragwort pulling, monitoring bird migration and generally enjoying ourselves out in the open air. It's a great day out.

Recently, a magnificent interpretation board has been set up at the entrance to the Moor (see photo below) showing the birds, rare plants and mam mals that inhabit it and there are many more projects planned with money generously donated.

'Quality of Life' is a comparatively new concept as an environmental term but here in Croxley, as the Old Merchant Taylor Scheme shows, we are in danger all the time of losing the beautiful areas that make this village

such a joy to live in.

As a Parish we need all the help we can get from volunteers who value the wonderful 'green spaces' we still have. Let us never forget the price of this beauty is eternal vigilance and support.







GARDEN COMPETITION


