EDITORIAL

"Now is the Winter of our discontent made glorious Summer " - well not quite, but the signs of Spring are at last present.

We are now complete in numbers and already the new Councillors are showing their keenness as can be seen by this edition of the Pump. Contrary to the jaundiced view shown by some, the Parish Council is very active and really does try to meet the needs of its constituents. Just a glance through this edition should convince you that we are active, our one regret being that our powers are limited by statute. We can complain to higher authorities. just as each individual can by picking up the telephone. Should you ring the Parish Office, please understand when you are told that the matter that concerns you is outside our remit. We shall note your enquiry or complaint and endeavour to use our best efforts to help you but we cannot work miracles. However, change is on the agenda. The Government, in its wisdom, has brought out plans to Local change the focus of Government. Already District Councils are grappling with changes the form and trying out government deemed best suited for them. Teething troubles are evident but, eventually, they will be tried and tested and should finally be for the better.

Proposals on responsibilities could change things for you in our community. It is likely that powers will be passed down tiers of Local Government so that matters are dealt with more locally and where people are more involved, knowing the particular problems, and best able to deal with them in the interest of the local community.

Details are not yet complete but are beginning to gel and, eventually, it will depend on us and of course on you.

To become a quality Parish Council, we must demonstrate that we are capable, give best value for money and are all elected. This last point is where you most definitely come in for it depends on the willingness of the electors to put a cross where it matters. first having offered themselves for service by contesting available seats on the Council. Apathy can kill any experiment however well thought out and worthwhile.

Representing your fellow residents on the Parish Council is not a matter of reward nor of glory, as those of us who have served for some years know. It is a matter of hard work for little thanks but then we did not expect thanks when we offered, our main concern was the village we are proud to live in. We value your support so when some venture fires your imagination why not ring up your local councillor and say so, loud and clear.

This edition contains articles on current activities both social and practical. It should give some idea of the scope of our concerns but every meeting that we hold brings up new concerns. Any concern is usually left to the Clerk to action but he does it better when individual councillors help and they are showing their willingness more and more.

All our meetings are publicised in the Library - why not acquaint yourself and come along to show your support and find out more of what we do. All too often the cry is: "But what do the Parish Council do?" A case in point is the weekly shopping bus which has now been running for many years on a Friday to take our Senior Citizens to the shops in Watford. It is a weekly treat for them and is much appreciated. However, we have recently gained some new passengers who claim not to have heard of it until recently. How do we let you know. It is publicised in this newsletter, in the Library, at Residential Homes and in Doctors' Surgeries. This seems adequate but does not seem to reach everyone. Read this edition and perhaps you will understand better what we are trying to do.

SOME CHILDHOOD REMINISCENCES OF A SEPTUAGENARIAN

Firstly I must confess to having lived in Croxley Green only since 1994, although I had some knowledge of the area since moving to Oxhey in 1969, especially after our elder daughter married Ian Langrish in 1983.

lan is the youngest son of the late Ray and Mary Langrish, Ray having had a hardware shop in Vicarage Road for some years. The family lived in Canterbury Way.

My own formative years from 1934-57 were spent in Southall, the town at that time having a mostly white population, and my reminiscences here cover my recollections of some of the aspects of living during the pre-war and early war years.

Regular home deliveries and services - (we were an ordinary family)



Sacks of coal carried from an open lorry and tipped into our coal shed, situated just behind our back door. (No one had central heating in those days!)

A deaf itinerant window cleaner called from time to time to clean the windows of our two-storey, three-bedroom semi.

Shopping

Like most families we did not have a 'fridge' and so my mother would walk about a mile each way to our local Sainsbury's store several times a week. This store had separate counters for different products, at each of which the customers would queue to be served.

Very few commodities were pre-packed: the bacon would be sliced on a circular cutter, the butter would be made up with what looked like wooden bats and the cheese cut with a wire cutter. Most of these activities would be done as orders were given by the customers. Finally, all the goods would be paid for in cash.

Just a few recollections which might stir the memories of some of our older residents, while appearing puzzling and archaic to our younger readers.

Our problems are small, indeed very small, when compared to other areas for example the Lake District – one of our most beautiful National Parks.


Beloved by Wordsworth the great poet and a vital part of our national heritage. All over our country the way of life is changing, involving particular misery for those living there, such as farmers.

ONE WAY TO GO!


Traffic and cars/ vehicles everywhere, what to do? Lack of parking, traffic flow problems, Does this sound like your road?

Should we make more roads one way? Some will say that they will become rat runs, will they? Do you believe a one way system would benefit your road? Crescents for example.

First in last out would it be that awkward?

Are you concerned that the lack of passing space in your road would restrict emergency vehicles? Do you believe that, if your pavement was wide enough, parking bays could be created? Would you rather have a large grass verge or a smaller one with additional parking, making the roads wider?

It is something to consider, and it has already been done in some roads. Whether your road qualifies I do not know, that is up to Three Rivers District Council /HCC Highway Partnership and our District / County Cllrs.



CARS AND THE COMMUNITY

Have you noticed that more and more front gardens are disappearing along the picturesque streets of Croxley Green? "Car Ports" are in fashion and quite rightly so, they are helping to get vehicles off the street. New Road for example was built over 100 yeas ago and suffers badly from the current build up of traffic. Many roads all over Croxley Green were built in the thirties when a car was an unheard-of luxury, consequently they do not have garages, many park at the side of the road: but with the modern fashion of having two or three cars per house this makes a nightmare of driving along these avenues at night or at weekends.

The answer seems to be to sacrifice your front garden. I have been a keen gardener for years but I have decided reluctantly to plan to remove my beloved plants and put down bricks – this space will take three cars. My only problem is to organise it tastefully so that I can keep a small flowerbed at the edge. At least there won't be any more "Turf wars" with my neighbours about the precise bit of footpath I can park on and I will be doing my small part to ease the dreadful congestion in my particular road.



Luckily many old houses in Croxley Green have large back gardens- I wish mine was larger. I intend to apply for an allotment in Barton Way to get rid of my surplus energy. With all the new facilities it will be a pleasant place to spend summer evenings.

Finally the Parish Council can do something to help streets which will soon be without the greenery of front gardens, It can in certain cases plant trees judiciously to bring that flush of green to your street. In at least one avenue in Croxley Green it has been very successful, all you need to do is make a request (having firstly consulted all your neighbours.) and the Environment committee will consider it in detail.

Car ports are probably one of the answers to Croxley Green's clogged up streets but your Parish Council can still help with roadside saplings in certain cases, just ask! Make a plan today!!



You may be required to show proof of eligibility.

The Parish Bus has now been running for several years and is well supported. Though bus passes are not accepted, the return fare is less than concessionary fares and the bus goes to your door. Shopping is thus made easier for our senior citizens. Many friends are made on this service, not least between the volunteer conductors and the passengers.

We have recently picked up some new passengers who professed to have only just heard of the service. We are therefore printing the timetable yet once again in the hope that it will reach the target for which the bus is operated. Though we are running at nearly capacity on some journeys we have adapted before and can do so again.

TREE PLANTING

WHEELY GOOD BUY

Croxley Green Parish Council remains committed to encouraging healthy environmentally friendly forms of travel in the village.


It is for this reason that the Council has decided to purchase three cycle racks, which will be placed around Croxley Green for the benefit of those who prefer pedal power to petrol power. We will be consulting the public over where the racks would be of best use, but at the moment we are considering sites at the top and bottom shops in Baldwin Lane and at the top of Mill Lane on Watford Road.

The cycle racks take the form of a "toast-rack" design, which will enable up to six bikes to be securely and safely locked up while their owners can make use of the local shopping facilities.

It is hoped that the "toast- racks" will increase security, encouraging more people to jump on their bikes for the journey to the shops, whilst at the same time reducing the amount of bikes left strewn on the pavements waiting to trip up passing pedestrians.

The racks are seen as a good investment given that the Council can remove them from any given site and relocate them elsewhere in the Parish if the need arises. If you have any suggestions regarding the placement of the new "toast – rack" please do not hesitate to pass your comments on to the Parish Council offices.

It promises to be wild and wet but most of all we hope it will be a fun day that will leave happy memories for both participants and the supporters of the teams.





THE HORSE TROUGH ALL SAINTS CHURCH/GREEN




