


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

BLOOMING SUMMER TIME





NEW INITIATIVES



MORE ABOUT STONES ORCHARD



For those not familiar with this part of Croxley, this is one of the old cherry orchards of about 3½ acres, sandwiched between Yorke Mead School, Dickinsons Playing Field and The Green.

Last year I wrote about the birds and other wildlife to be found in this area. Although much is the same, some species have diminished whilst others have increased, but this is nature's way.

This year while walking my dog Bess, I have been taking a note of the wild flowers. However, I must confess that as an amateur "botanist" I may have missed some flowers and particularly the grasses. Also, of course, some plants do not flower every year. The Parish Council's policy of only cutting some of the grassed area has had a marked effect on the spread of flowers, either by self-seeding or windborne methods.

Past surveys of the flora and fauna in the Orchard have noted at least 16 different grasses, 56 wild flowers and overall some 100 species have been recorded around the area of The Green and the Orchard. In August I was particularly pleased to see the lovely pale blue harebell in the meadow area in front of Croxley House.

Butterflies, moths and insects such as Brimstone, Common Blue, Small Skipper, Large White, Small Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral, Peacock, Meadow Brown and many smaller moths have been abundant.

Planning and Development Committee Update

As Chairman of the Planning and Development Committee of the Parish Council I thought I'd like to update you on some of the planning matters that we have looked at since our last publication. My Committee sees all the Croxley Green planning applications which are submitted to Three Rivers District Council and our job is to comment on them from a local point of view. None of us are planning experts but I am always pleasantly surprised that the majority of comments we make are accepted by the District Planning Officers.

Since the beginning of May we have seen 76 applications. The vast majority of these are residential and they include side and rear extensions, loft conversions and erections of conservatories.

We have had two or three applications for the building of new houses on land situated in the rear gardens of existing properties. As a committee we look hard at these applications and have been pleased to see that they appear to have been refused planning permission by TRDC in accordance with our comments.

We were pleased to note the enforcement action taken by our County and District Councils with regards to the misuse of land at the Smallholding in Lavrock Lane. For those of you that do not know this area, if you go to the end of Harvey Road and turn right into Croxley Hall Woods, the Smallholding is about 500 metres down on the left hand side.

A new parking enforcement regime will be up and running soon along parts of Watford Road and at the end of Frankland Road at the area near the row of shops. We were pleased to be consulted on this scheme but very disappointed that our local knowledge and ideas were not taken up by the District Council. At the junction of Watford Road and Frankland Road parking will be limited to one hour only, with no return within two hours, between the hours of 8am and 6pm Monday to Saturday inclusive. (We requested this be extended to a two hour concession). There will be no parking at all for 10 metres on the junction of Watford Road and The Crescent. The idea of this enforcement is to prevent commuter parking in the area and to encourage the use of the car park at Croxley Underground Station.

NEW IDEAS FOR 2004-2005

My Committee is more than aware of the need to be financially prudent in our spending plans for the forthcoming year. We will look long and hard at any proposals for spending. I understand that it is our money, in the form of the Council Tax Precept that we spend, and my Committee will ensure that only sound and well thought out ideas are brought forward.

However, the following MAY be in our 2004-2005 budget.

- · Community Bus and an extension of the service to Rickmansworth
- The provision of new bus shelters
- The provision of one or two new public benches
- The provision of one or two new dog hygiene bins
- The installation of a Flagpole outside the Parish Council Office

Our discussions will take place in October, November and the early part of December of this year and they will be open to the public. Agendas are placed in the Library so if you are interested in what we want to achieve then please come along and let us know. Just contact the Clerk a few days before on 01923 710250.

Please remember that the Parish Council is YOUR local Council. It is not run on party political lines and my fellow councillors and I just want to try and enhance the quality of life within the parish.

Local democracy IS important. Apathy among voters and disillusionment about politics in general is allowing extremists to gain power. Don't let it happen here. Support your Parish Council and help us to keep Croxley Green a great place to live and work in.

A PLAGUE OF FROGS


A plague of frogs a surfeit of fat people, Abundance correlating with lean cattle. These things obsess my mind disturb my sleep

News from the Environment and Amenity Committee

For the future we plan to maintain The Green and Stones Orchard to the high levels that we have achieved this year and hope that everyone in Croxley Green will continue to enjoy their benefits. We are also hoping to plant some more fruit trees in the Orchard, the probable varieties being Pear and Plum. In addition we are planning to relocate two flowering cherry trees.

The Annual Garden Competition, now in its eleventh year, was again a great success. Twenty five gardens plus six public house gardens were judged and we were very pleased to have some new entrants. As ever the standard was very high which made judging difficult (as did the extremely hot weather in July!). The final judging was undertaken by Councillor Elizabeth Boléat, Chairman of Three Rivers District Council, Mrs Kath Perry, Chairman of Croxley Green Gardening Club and Mr Dave Cartwright of D&J Nurseries. The prizegiving ceremony took place on Friday 10th October. Over 40 people attended and a pleasant evening was had by all. Our thanks go to all the competitors, judges and everyone involved in making the competition so enjoyable.

The Parish Council was represented at the Revels in June with the E&A Committee maintaining a display of photographs of the 2002 Garden Competition. The Horse Trough All Saints Church was planted with daffodil bulbs for the spring and this was followed by geraniums and bedding plants for the summer season. Spring bulbs will shortly be planted for 2004.

Once again Cllr Robert Ridley organised "Fun on The Green". This took place on Sunday 13th July which must have been one of the hottest days of the year. Some 70 brave souls turned out in the heat and we even had a visitor from Belarus. All the usual games, from sack races to tug-of-war, were played and a good day was had by all.

The Council's Best Dressed Christmas Shop Window Competition will take place in early December and the annual Christmas tree will be placed in the Library entrance. Similarly, the Christmas street lights will be installed in the designated areas of the village in good time for the festive season.

The parish's canine population continues to be catered for with the provision of dog waste bags. These can be obtained free of charge from the Library and the Parish Council Offices.

We were very pleased that the Parish Council's Rangers are now qualified tree specialists and can undertake arboreal work, having passed all the relevant training courses.



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MULTI USE GAMES AREA



As this edition of the Parish Pump goes to press we are hopeful that next year we will have a multi use games area installed in the Barton Way Recreation Ground. This will be available for everyone in the community and, if it is approved by the Executive Committee at Three Rivers District, will be a joint project between them and us.

Hopefully, in partnership with the Parish Council, a new 7-a-side football/hockey/netball/basketball pitch will be built by TRDC.

We wrote to 100 local residents whose houses back onto the Barton Way Recreation Ground, inviting them to a public consultation meeting which was attended by 14 residents. Concerns were highlighted concerning behaviour, language, toilets, parking and possible floodlighting. All comments were noted and will be taken into consideration when the final plans are drawn up. Before any work commences the plans will be on public display, however the strength of public opinion was such that initially at least, the area will not be floodlit.

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

MASSACRE IN CROXLEY GREEN



In the local paper last November I saw a job advertisement for the position of Assistant Ranger with the Parish Council. I thought that perhaps this job would suit me, as I had some relevant qualifications, wide experience in that type of work and have lived in Croxley Green all my life and know the area very well. So I applied for the job and was eventually offered it.

Our first major task was the coppicing of hazel and removal of dead elm trees along the hedgerows of The Green. The work was met with approval from some residents and disapproval from others, one particular parishioner even referred to it as "massacring". But those people who understand the principle behind coppicing thought it was "a job well done".

Coppicing, a process of cutting back the growing stems of trees almost to ground level, has been a way of managing trees in Britain for thousands of years. The process encourages the tree to live longer, almost indefinitely. It also allows more light to get into the hedgerow thereby creating more diverse species growing in and around it, which in turn provides a habitat for more insects and birds. Also, a crop of wood is harvested which can be used for anything from dead hedging or hurdle making to materials vital in thatching roofs and making weaved furniture.

Hopefully, this explanation of coppicing will help residents understand why we undertook this work and the purpose behind it.

Since then Carl, the Head Ranger, and I have undertaken many different projects, from laying steps in footpath 7 (from the top of The Green leading to the River Chess), to hedge planting in Stones Orchard.

I was very pleased that the Parish Council decided to send Carl and me on courses in order that we could qualify as "tree surgeons". We were both glad to pass these courses in August.

All in all I have enjoyed my first ten months in the job and hope to continue enjoying it for a lot longer.

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

We have always been in the habit of using "doggy bags", having owned a black and tan miniature dachshund named Emma who lived to over 18 years. Emma has been superseded by a shaded red mini dachshund called Amber who is now six months old.

Using these doggy bags is not without its funnier moments. When the dog is taken out for a "toilet break", using these doggy bags can present problems when the dog decides to pull on the lead at the critical moment, or when there is pouring rain and a howling gale you find yourself running down the road to retrieve the bag blown away in the wind, only to start the whole procedure all over again. The other option is to keep your foot firmly on the dog's lead or tie the leash to a fence or gatepost. Doggy bags and bins are essential for the cleanliness of our streets, footpaths and open spaces. Dog bags can be obtained free of charge from the Library or the Parish Council Offices and we are pleased that so many residents within the parish are responsible about dog hygiene.

A History of The Croxley Green Royal British Legion

The Royal British Legion was formed in 1921 and the Croxley Green branch was formed in the same year.

It was a small "Band of Brothers" who met once a month in the Dickinson Guildhouse. Following World War II, the membership grew and we held special social events every year at the Guildhouse. We later made an agreement with the local T.A. HQ on The Green to allow us to use their clubroom every Saturday evening.

We held social events and bingo which was a great success, our membership expanded tremendously. We had the use of the club bar, but of course all profits went to the Territorial Army.

We acquired a piece of land at 161 Watford Road and in 1954 we decided to build our own headquarters. In 1956 our profit for the year was £400 and we agreed to go forward with the project. Fortunately we had members in different trades who volunteered their labour free of charge.

"Jacko" and Harold Picton, who had a demolition and site clearance business, very soon had our site cleared of bushes and rubbish. With their heavy equipment they laid the footings and supplied sufficient second-hand bricks to build the four walls. We bought all the timber needed as well as electric heaters. The second-hand bricks were donated. We took a loan of £1400 for the metal roof frame. Most of the young members worked in various ways free of charge. We opened in 1959 with bingo three times a week and dancing on a Saturday after the bingo. Under Royal British Legion rules we had to form a separate club to allow us to have a bar. Our reputation grew very quickly bringing new members within a 100 mile radius.

The branch continued to run the entertainment and in 1964 we had a new lounge built to accommodate another 100 members. In 1988 the branch handed all entertainment to the club.

For over 42 years the bingo has been held every Monday and Thursday with dancing on Saturdays. In the lounge area we had snooker and pool tables.

All Saints Church Spire

On the evening of 25th September 1940 all seemed quiet in Croxley Green as the villagers prepared to go to bed. Suddenly, at 9.36pm, there was an enormous explosion and the windows of all houses from Scots Hill to New Road were shattered.

What had happened? The answer was that a German mine attached to a parachute had fallen beside All Saints Church and had exploded. The east end of the Church was badly damaged and the roof was blown off the steeple. In fact, the Church was the most badly affected by bombing in the whole of Hertfordshire and was not repaired again fully until 1947. The parishioners had to make the long walk to Saint Mary's in Rickmansworth. Even today there are few stained glass windows in All Saints as the beautiful windows were all blasted to bits by the explosion.

Nowadays we take for granted the beautiful spire as part of the historic heart of Croxley – the bell faithfully tolls out the hours over The Green, and coming up Scots Hill it is the first real symbol of our village that one can see. It looks in good order and beautiful at first sight but if one gazes carefully at the cedar shingles on the roof, one can see that many are missing and others are rotten. The Church does not have the money to repair it as steeplejacks and scaffolding are very expensive indeed. There is a possibility that what the Germans failed to do sixty years ago, apathy will allow to destroy in the next few years as the roof caves in.

All Saints, like many churches today, has a dwindling congregation. They give generously but gone are the vast amounts of yesteryear. If you value the view of your beautiful spire and want to continue to have it there you might like to donate to the All Saints Spire Appeal Fund. Think it over, you may never use our church, although it is open every day for those who seek refuge for a few minutes from the noise outside; but how would Croxley look if this historic spire is lost for ever? It is up to you.
