Croxley 'Green' Group

The Keep Croxley 'Green' Group are an action group comprised of residents who strongly oppose the recent application by London Underground (LUL) to build a rail track replacement depot on a greenbelt site in Croxley. We are not against the replacement of the rail track, which is undoubtedly necessary to improve a rail network that has been poorly managed and allowed to degrade to what is presently an antiquated and unreliable method of commuting. However, we firmly believe that the Croxley greenbelt site is totally unsuitable for this highly industrial development, and that LUL, if pushed, have other alternatives for this depot.

Where is the proposed site?

The site is situated on the edge of Long Valley Wood at the back of Frankland Road. It is bordered by the Grand Union Canal and Common Moor on one side and ancient woodland on the other. The site is accessible from Lavroc Lane (Footpath 11) and Mill Lane (footpath 17). Several well used paths cross the site linking Frankland Road to the canal towpath.

What is the history of the site?

The site was originally an old quarry where evidence of ice age habitation was uncovered over a century ago. In the 1950's the site was compulsorily purchased by London Underground to be used solely as a tip for earth, spoil and waste products resulting from the development of the London Underground. At this time, the site became known locally as the old Croxley Tip. However, London Underground stopped tipping on the site over 20 years ago and since then it has been left abandoned. Consequently, the site has slowly evolved into a tranquil area enjoyed by hundreds of local residents as a local amenity. LUL have failed to maintain the land or care for it in any way so it has been local residents who have, over the years, cleared the site of illegally tipped rubbish, kept foliage cut back from paths, planted grass seed and generally maintained the area. The site now merges with the surrounding woodland and provides a safe habitat for a wealth of wildlife including some rare and protected species. Deer are regularly spotted foraging on the site and rare birds and butterflies are regularly recorded. Buddleias grow in abundance and the locals now know the site as the Buddleia Walk.

Why are residents so opposed to the development of this site?

Residents and local councillors feel that the proposed rail track depot would be a totally inappropriate development of this tranquil greenbelt site. The depot requires the use of large industrial equipment and operational hours will include trains shunting up and down the Metropolitan line to Watford and back in order to enter or exit the site during the night and at weekends. The site will require high levels of lighting which risk disrupting nocturnal animals, especially several bat species known to use the canal as a feeding corridor. The only road access available to the site is down public footpath 11. It would be totally impractical, not to mention dangerous for pedestrians to share a footpath with HGV's accessing the site. After considering these, and other concerns, the Three Rivers Planning Committee voted unanimously to reject this application.

If the application has been rejected, why are residents still so worried?

LUL has the right to appeal to the Secretary of State against the decision made by the Council. This would very likely involve a Public Enquiry and the battle to prevent this development will continue. They have until 16th December to lodge their appeal. It has already taken residents hundreds of hours to research LUL's application and with only limited resources, we feel the battle is tipped in favour of a large organisation with professional expertise at their fingertips. The Keep Croxley 'Green' group are therefore calling on the whole community of Croxley to stand together against this development of our precious greenbelt. Residents already have the full support of MP Richard Page; District and local councillors; the Parish Council; Residents Association; Campaign to Protect Rural England; Planning Aid; amongst others. Posters are being delivered by the Residents Association to display in your windows and it will help greatly if residents also write to Richard Page MP expressing their concerns as it is the weight of objection that will help to influence an appeal decision. STONES ORCHARD

Every year we plant new fruit tress in Stones Orchard. year Every some get snapped, uprooted and thrown around the Orchard. Why? Who knows, perhaps boredom, perhaps just bloody mindedness or maybe ignorance. More unfortunate vandalism.

These trees are carefully selected and have to be especially grafted for us. They are all local Hertfordshire fruit varieties, are very hard to obtain and have to be ordered up to a year in advance. So to see them snapped and uprooted for no reason is very frustrating.

This year so far we have put in five trees, with more to come. The trees were planted on a Friday and by Monday morning one had already been snapped and uprooted. Where is the sense in this? It seems a shame after careful selection that someone deems it "fun" to ruin them.

Hertfordshire fruit varieties are chosen to keep old, local fruit varieties from extinction as these are seldom grown in people's gardens due to the better fruiting and growth qualities of newer varieties. The only way of keeping such varieties alive is in orchards like Stones Orchard and other less commercial orchards with a

view towards conserving traditional varieties.

If the perpetrators read this article please think about what you are doing. What does it achieve? Nothing! You're spoiling something for everyone so please leave the trees alone.

Hopefully the remaining trees and any we plant in the future will be left intact. We are looking into new ways of protecting them and hopefully we can solve this problem.

Got the bug?

Having written a number of articles about the flora and fauna to be found in the orchard, this year I thought I would write about "creepy crawlies" beetles, insects etc – "Big Mistake".

Identifying twenty four easily named and common species I came to a dead stop with "Ichneumon suspiciousus",. Most beetles seem to have names such as this and would mean nothing to all

but the serious bug hunter. I gave up. <u>Listed Meadow</u> grasshopper, common earwig, ladybird 7 spot and 22 spot, violet ground beetle, lock chaffer, click beetle, hoverfly, blue bottle, house fly, wasp, bee, red and black ants. Millipede, garden spider, common wood louse, slugs and snails, stag beetle, ground beetle, lace wing, field digger wasp. There was

however some consolation in noting the continual spread of wild flowers, bryony and common toad flax in particular, and much to my delight an evening primrose, much to my regret this flowered and was cut down and dug out (hope you are reading this you vandal). Fortunately I found one other plant and some cuckoopint.

Two ring necked parakeets have been seen and a green woodpecker has been visiting, the jays have reared a family. Butterflies and moths have been a little scarce, but one painted lady came for a short stay.

Enjoy this delightful walking area and help to keep it tidy by using the bins provided.

Croxley Common Moor - An Appreciating Asset

Did you know there is a wild open space in Croxley Green where, if you're lucky, on a fine day you can see kites, buzzards, kingfishers, woodpeckers and the occasional muntjac deer?

Yes, more and more walkers, bird watchers, orienteers and just about anyone who fancies wilderness and fresh air are discovering this heath land. On a summer's evening one can imagine oneself walking in the Peak District, rather than just sixteen miles from Trafalgar Square as the crow flies.

When I first came to Croxley in 1962 there were about a dozen 'commoners' who had special rights on the land there. Back in Victorian times to have rights on a common could be a very valuable thing – the right to trap rabbits, to graze geese, to collect fire wood and rushes for thatching, not to mention the right to graze five sheep and two cattle or three goats and a horse. Up to the First World War there were thirty commoners, each of whom had some special rights.

The number dwindled to about five in the seventies and only one used his right to graze cows. The right of 'commonage' was regulated by Act of Parliament to keep in tune with the times and the moor is now administered by the Countryside Management Service, Three Rivers and the Friends of Croxley Moor; of which I am the Chairman. In fact, it is a site of special scientific interest (SSSI). We do bush clearance, ragwort control, putting up nesting boxes and general 'management'. 

Obituary - John Hedges

Most people will be aware that on Monday 27th September, John Hedges, at the relatively young age of 69, died of a heart attack in Watford General Hospital following an operation on his foot from which he appeared to be recovering.

Whilst repeating members deepest condolences to his family on this sad occasion it is appropriate to acknowledge and pay tribute to the significant part John played in the affairs of Croxley Green Parish Council

Born in Croxley Green and attending Central School, he left to join a firm of architects with a view to qualifying.

Between 1953 and 1955 his studies were interrupted while he did his National Service in the RAF, becoming an expert on interpreting aerial photographs. On leaving the RAF he resumed his studies and became interested in RICKMANSWORTH METHODIST CHURCH YOUTH CLUB AND YOUTH FELLOWSHIP where he became leader and remained so for 25 years.

It was at the YOUTH FELLOWSHIP that he met Molly, they were married in 1963 and subsequently had three children, Naomi, David and Petra.

After their marriage, for economic reasons, they moved to Chesham where they lived until 1967 then moving to Rickmansworth until 1976 when they moved back to Croxley Green.

John qualified as an architect in 1964 and although no longer living in the village, maintained interest in village affairs working with his father who was also involved in most things locally.

Resident once again in Croxley Green, John became a member of the Croxley Residents Association, becoming editor of The Resident in 1986 and remaining so until the end.

He also became a member and increasingly involved in the Croxley Green Society, whose major interest was organising and running The Revels on the Green. John's father had been a senior organiser of The Revels for many years and John took over from him in 1986. Ably assisted by Molly, John worked tirelessly on The Revels for almost 20 years and derived immense satisfaction from its annual success.

Early in the 1980's, together with several other members of the Residents Association, he became involved in discussions regarding the creation of a Parish Council., Although initially somewhat reluctant he progressively became more enthusiastic and eventually Croxley Green Parish Council was formed in 1986, and with 15 other people, John was formally elected a founder member.

Elected Chairman in 1992, he presided over the development of the Council from having a part-time Clerk with the Parish Office in his dining room and meetings held in the Reading Room of the old Croxley Library, to having a full time Clerk with an assistant in their own office together with a Council Chamber and two Rangers with a purpose built garage/workshop for their equipment. With a short break between May 1999 and July 2000 he remained Chairman until May 2001. He retired from the Council in January 2002.

John had three loves in his life, his family, his church and Croxley Green. He also had one major dislike, this was confrontation and he firmly believed that any problem could be solved by rational discussion between reasonable people, most of the time he was right.

Qualifying as a lay preacher with the Methodist Church at St. Mary's Church, Rickmansworth in 1994, as the years passed John spent more and more of his time on this activity.

Always ready to listen and to help, one thing is for sure, there are very few people left in Croxley Green with John Hedges dedication to the community, he will indeed be sorely missed.

Family Fun at Croxley Common Moor

During the summer (which seems like a long time ago now!) just under 200 people visited Croxley Common Moor to enjoy the sunshine and take part in a series of fun activities run by Three Rivers District Council. Children participated in events which ranged from practising their origami skills to hunting out all sorts of creepy crawlies that were hiding on the moor – no bug was safe! We grabbed our nets, put on our wellies and took a dip in to a shallow part of the River Gade. On emptying our bulging nets we found an array of life ranging from freshwater shrimps to Bull's Headfish (also known as Miller's Thumb due to their flat heads) which like to lurk amongst the relative safety of the river bed.

A mini-beast safari led to the discovery of an interesting assortment of insect life, some of which the children (and parents) were seeing for the first time. Wriggly worms and spiders produced shrieks from some. Colourful shieldbugs and ladybirds produced smiles. However, the aerial acrobatics of click beetles, which lie on their backs and use their wing cases to jump up to 12 cm in the air, did not fail to delight even the most squeamish.

Three Rivers Museum on the Map

In June Three Rivers Museum was contacted by an independent television company asking whether they could come and film in Basing House. They asked for maps and other information relating to Money Hill House to be available. Barbara Owens, the Chairman, and Ann Vernau, the Secretary, collected together the required items and welcomed members of the film crew when they arrived. Passers-by soon became interested when they realised there was a 'celebrity', Vic Reeves, in their midst. Barbara was filmed inside the Museum showing Vic the various artefacts and explaining the history of Money Hill. It is hoped some, at least of the footage will have survived to feature in a new programme Who Do You Think You Are? to be shown on BBC2 this autumn.

In a somewhat more academic vein the Museum also welcomed three geologists and archaeologists employed on the Ancient Human Occupation of Britain (AHOB) project. In their quest to find out when the first humans reached Britain, Dr Danielle Schreve of the Royal Holloway College, Dr Mark White of Durham University and Professor John Catt of University College London visited Three Rivers Museum to examine the many bones, flint hand-axes and other tools in the Museum's collection. Funded by a £1 million grant from Leverhulme Trust, they are researching sites and reexamining existing collections using modern scientific techniques. They were able to identify several locally found artefacts of interest to the AHOB project and in the process helped the Museum to gain a better appreciation of the historical value of certain items in its collection.

The Museum in Basing House between Watersmeet and Rickmansworth Library, is open to the public from 2pm to 4pm on Mondays to Fridays, and 10am to 4pm on Saturdays. It can also be opened for group visits by prior arrangement at other times.

Barton Way MSC

In July this year we were able to open the Multi Sports Court. After involving our Three Rivers District Council Councillors they agreed to use the money that had been in their budget to revitalise the disused tennis court. This amenity is there for use by all of the residents of Croxley Green. However, some people can't help but try to spoil others enjoyment. Vandalism has already occurred and makes you wonder why, whilst some try to better the environment they reside in, others are determined to ruin the facilities. Structural damage isn't the only way to vandalise; dog owners are allowing their pets to foul the MSC playing area, which is one reason why it is fenced in, as are children's play areas. If you know who allows their dogs to foul the MSC, please inform the Parish Council so we can take the appropriate steps.

Tennis Wall

After discussion with Three Rivers District Council Councillors, it appears that they are in full support of building a tennis wall in the Baldwins Lane Park. Apparently Three Rivers District Council are going to refurbish the tennis courts. so incorporating a tennis wall makes economic sense at this time. The Parish Council is attempting to create ongoing dialogue with out District Councillors and we hope that further joint projects in Croxley can come to fruition for the benefit of our residents.

Barton REC Sports Walls

Your Parish Council are in dialogue with Three Rivers District Council to hopefully build two sports walls (6 foot high, 8 foot wide?) in Barton Way Rec. These walls hopefully could be placed at the approximate distance of goals on an under elevens size pitch, and could be multi-use for anyone with a ball. We have asked Three Rivers District Council to fund this project and are awaiting their reply.

Winton Crescent Parking

The residents of Winton Crescent were contacted by Three Rivers District Council informing them that parking restrictions were to be introduced which would lead to no parking Monday to Friday 9am to 6pm in their road. The Parish Council was in the process of surveying the residents about whether they would prefer Winton Crescent to become one way, lose their grass verges and have parking bays where appropriate, or to have a period of time daily when there would be no parking during the week. We arranged a meeting with District Cllr R Seabourne where the residents were able to express their views. The consensus was to have hour one parking restriction during the day, this is now in the process of being implemented.

We hope that dialogue with the residents of Winton Crescent has resulted in a solution to their problems and we have now also surveyed the residents of Springfield Close for their views on car parking. We are still attempting to get NPC to put better signage relating to locality and tariff/spaces available in the station car park.

Parish Councillors

The Parish Council needs residents who take an interest in Croxley to join the Parish Council. You would have to be able to donate a few evenings per month and some odd days throughout the year. Why do it you ask? You may have ideas that you believe would enhance Croxley, ideas that could improve the environment that you live in. That's what the existing Councillors believe. Scots Hill Planters

Three Rivers District Council refurbished the retail area on Scots Hill this year. Part of this refurbishment included the siting of two large concrete planters on the pavement. The Parish Council deem these to be unsightly and unsuitable for this area. However, if you, the parishioners, believe that they should stay, be placed somewhere else in the parish, or not be there at all, please contact the office. otherwise we will endeavour to have them removed.

"Skinner" Gibson

After reading the very interesting account of the Croxley Revels submitted by Margaret Hobbs, it led me to think that my husband is probably the oldest resident who was born and has lived in Croxley for the whole of his 90 years.

After leaving "NEGGIE" Wilson's school at the age of 14, he worked for the next three years for Clarks the Butchers in Vicarage Road. Watford. deliverina customers unable to get to the shop. The bike he was given was twice as heavy as he was. The large basket on the front was enamel lined which upset the balance of the bike, causing it to fall over and distribute some of the contents. No sealed plastic bags, just a small piece of paper for wrapping, no prizes for guessing what happened to some of the meat, or what he did with his apron. A few years previous his dad had started a coal business and Croxley was expanding so people needed coke for their nice new boilers, so Frank at age 17 changed from butcher boy to coalman. The firm of J A Gibson & Sons were well respected in the district and very generous too, loaning a lorry and driver for many occasions, scout holidays, furniture moving, tables and chairs for garden parties

etc., and of course on regular call for the Croxley Revels all at no expense to the recipients. A year before war broke out in 1939, he joined the Auxiliary Fire Service, the "Headquarters" being in a garage in Copthorne Road. Again, using one of Gibson's lorries to tow equipment needed for fire fighting. One response was to the extensive fire at the oil refineries on the Essex Coast.

He was a very keen footballer, known locally as "SKINNER" sharing his years with "Rickmansworth Town" and "Dickinsons Croxley" plus two sessions with Watford FC after the war.

Naturally he has seen Croxley grow from a few streets to the thriving community which we know today. He just hopes and prays that he well never see his lovely "GREEN" desecrated. He has a very caring, loving family and although failing in mind and body during the last few years, he still hasn't lost his sense of humour.

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

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
