Bill Oddie's Red Backed Shrike in Exotic Croxley Green

What a wonderful year this has been for wild life in Croxley. It started with the blazing June sunshine and continued into the long hot summer.

The highlight was the arrival of an exotic red backed shrike from North Africa, which set up its home in an area of shrub land on Croxley Common Moor. It stayed there for several weeks awaiting a mate so that it could nest. Sadly no mate arrived, but about two hundred bird watchers known as "twitchers" came instead, day after day. Indeed, groups of them could be spotted carrying tripods, telescopes and other professional paraphernalia on their way to view our rare bird. I talked to travellers from Scotland, Wales, the Isle of Man and all over Britain who were our guests in Croxley, courtesy of the marvels of the internet rare bird's website.

The highlight was a morning in July when I met Bill Oddie and the BBC camera team filming for a series



that will take place this winter.

Red kites and buzzards are now regular visitors to the moor and we had a very successful kingfisher and tawny owl nesting year. A Cambridge professor spent a week studying the last colony of mottled moths left in Britain, which live on the petty whins (a type of rare bush) found on our moor. I think that this was the happiest time that the Friends of Croxley Common Moor have ever experienced. All our efforts have borne fruit and in our tenth year of existence our splendid rare meadowland site has achieved national and international recognition.

Thanks for the support from the people of Croxley, and especially to our volunteers who meet every second Sunday of the month throughout the year at 10am at Lock 79 of the canal (opposite Croxley Metropolitan Station).

Those of you who are interested in a couple of hours bush clearance and habitat development are very welcome to come, it's great fun to be associated with such a uniquely successful project.

Village Ponds

Ponds are the home to one third of British native plants, over 1200 species of invertebrates and all British amphibians, as well as birds and fish.

Seventy five percent of Britain's ponds and pond life has disappeared in the last hundred years. Some of the ponds have been filled up purposefully; others have gradually silted up and dried out, while a few have been lost due to our water table lowering.

Village ponds were originally kept open by livestock trampling down aquatic plants whilst drinking. In the past people used these ponds to swell their cart wheels and also used the ponds as a source of water to fight fire. Without this activity ponds silt up to marshy bog, gradually trees recolonise and they revert to woodland.

The first nationwide effort in pond conservation began in 1974 with the "Save Our Village Pond Campaign". Recent research shows that conservation schemes can be overdone. If a pond has been cleaned out and sediment removed periodically then this course of action is appropriate. If, however, the pond is in a woodland setting, removing the silt can do more harm than good.

A new policy in the conservation of ponds is to manage less and create more. Put into practice this would mean creating a new pond next to an old, unmanaged pond allowing wildlife to transfer from the old pond to the new without damaging the ecosystem of the old pond.

However, appropriate action is determined by the pond itself and its surroundings. As no two ponds are the same there isn't a right or wrong way to do this for all ponds.

It is usually thought to be best practice and cheaper to conserve and manage an existing pond than to create a new one. For ponds to support a reasonable amount of wildlife they need:

- to have a reasonable depth of clear water
- to be open to sunlight
- to be free of rotting organic matter

When clearing overgrown choked ponds the process should be carried out in two sections. One half in the first Autumn/Winter, the second in the next. This allows for natural recolonisation of wildlife within the pond. This should be repeated at a minimum of ten yearly intervals. If this process is not undertaken the gradual accumulation of organic

matter within the pond decreases its depth until it becomes no more than boggy soil, killing the pond and therefore leaving its inhabitants without an environment to live and breed in.

Some of the species likely to be encountered in ponds are:



Plants

Common Reedmace, Burreed, Yellow flag, Native Yellow and White Water Lilies, Watermint, Broad-Leaved Pondweed, King Cup and Flowering Rush.



<u>Invertebrates</u>

Ramshorn snail, Great Pond snail, dragonflies, Damsel flies, Caddis flies, Water Boatman, Water spider and Whirligig beetles



Amphibians

Smooth newt, Palmate newt, Great crested newt, Common toad, Natterjack toad, common frog, Marsh frog and Edible frog.

All of Britain's ponds need careful attention to preserve them and the habitat they provide to wildlife before it is lost to us. The time to act is now, to conserve habitats for future generations to enjoy before it is too late. If seventy five percent of our ponds and pond life have been lost in the last hundred years, what will be lost in the next hundred?

A big thank you to all those who bought raffle tickets. This contributed £135.00 to the chairman's charity fund which helps raise funds for local organisations. This years charities are the Welcome Club and the British Heart Foundation.

Comments from both crafters and visitors alike were positive. Crafters particularly pointed out that they don't usually have many opportunities to show off their talents to the public, or help to promote craft activities in general. This event gave them the showcase to do this and giving up their Sunday was more than worthwhile.


The Community Bus

has been providing the free bus service above. This service has proved invaluable to many older residents who use it both as essential transport and as a social focus point. Recent usage of the service has been exceeding 50% of all available seats - what a result! There is still the scope to carry more however.

The cost to the local council tax payer works out at about £1.50 per household per year, half the price of just one single train ticket to Watford. Besides how do you get from Watford Met station to the town?!

Recently the viability of the service was brought into question, but at a Planning and Development Committee meeting on 1 November, unanimous backing was given to maintaining this valuable contribution to the well-being of our community.

New Road Shops

I'm pleased to say that my previous article on shops in New Road prompted a good response from our older citizens, which allowed some of my observations to be verified.

Before going into New Road proper, just have a quick look at the parade of shops in Watford Road opposite the Red House. Starting at Gonville Avenue end we had the following:butchers (Mr Drew), grocers (Hedges). toyshop (Mr Snatchel), hairdressers, Dr Bell's surgery, post office, fried fish shop (Murrays), chemist (Davis), sweet shop (Goodmans), and a cycle shop.

Crossing into New Road there were six cottages which were bombed in the war, flats now stand on this site. On the Red House side of the road there has been mention of a public house called The Rose, but this is questionable.

Carrying on along New Road:

267 sweetshop (Mrs Walley);222 barbers (Sharman then Evans);

Cheshire's of Ricky – cold meats etc;

gents tailors - Mr Batchelor.



In 1915 No's. 167/173 a fried fish and chip shop became Mrs Tom's sweet shop. On the other side of the butchers at No. 175 Mr Mead put out a stall in front of the cottage to sell wet fish and there was a ladies hairdresser where the library now stands.

No. 54 was a fried fish and chip touch with me or t shop, ladies hairdressers and then **Dave Neighbour**

a dry cleaners.

Many of these memories are from the thirties. Before the Barton Way estate was built, several people remember driving cattle down The Green for milking at

> dairies situated on Scots Hill and New Road and for slaughter at the rear of Jackson's butchers.

I particularly wish to thank Mrs Richardson of Springfield for sharing her memories with me. Also the owner of No. 115 New Road for giving me an old photograph of the original shop as Poulterers, the hooks for hanging poultry etc still show in their lounge ceiling. So in No. 115

we have Poulterers, wet fish, greengrocers, antiques, bicycle sales and now a residential property.

I am now researching the oldest part of Croxley Green – Scots Hill, so if any one has any information or old photographs please get in touch with me or the Parish Clerk.

Dear Parish Council,
Having read the Brigadier's
contribution in the Spring/Summer
issue with great interest, I too
decided to research the County
archives and was truly amazed at
the historical facts that came to
light. Whilst none related directly

to Croxley Green, the coming of

the Grand Union Canal did afford the opportunity for a certain commodity to be transported more easily via the wharf adjacent to Dickinsons Mill.

It would appear that in the 17th century, the very enterprising family, Clutterbucks of Sarratt, were working the Treacle mines adjacent to the family home. These were the only known mines of their kind in the country at that time it was only the coming of Messrs Tate & Lyle in the 1800's and their method of making treacle from cane sugar that saw the family riches go into decline and the family all but ended by the Great War.

The method of extracting the solidified treacle was very unique for that time in history. A large boiler house was built and the boiling water was used to liquify the treacle under ground, it was then pumped to the surface into large settling tanks where the heavier sediment sank to the bottom and the excess water was drawn off and used again. The heavier treacle was then filled into barrels and transported via the canal to London and Birmingham etc.

Letters and more.....!!!

Further research revealed two other names as being workers at the mines and descendents of these two still living in the area as late as the 30's & 40's. The senior of the two bearing the name of , Sib son' and resided at 'Dead Man's Ash' he is listed as being the Head Stoker, in charge of steam raising! And the other as 'Poulter' from Chandlers Cross, classed as Assistant Stoker.

What is unique about the method of extraction is the very fact that the same method is used today to extract oil from the ground where pressure underground is too low for it to come to the surface naturally. Water pumped in and the oil flows to the surface on top of the water, quite simple really.

The ruins of the Clutterbucks House were still in evidence as late as the 1940's whether or not they are still to be seen is highly unlikely no doubt due to the high demand for land for house building.

Any further gems of history I unearth in the future I shall be only too pleased to forward to you for further consideration.
