We are fortunate that we are not in the position of Hertfordshire County Council who is planning cuts of £150 million. The scale of these savings will obviously have an impact on the lives of many residents of the County in terms of social care, education, children's services, highways and policing. The Parish Council currently funds one of the Police Community Support Officers that you see around the village and we hope that this valuable resource will remain so we can be safe and secure in our environment. If you have any thoughts on how you would like your money spent please do contact your local councillor, we would like ideas from the community.

Next May will see the local elections and it will be time to elect a new Parish Council. Much is being said about the Big Society and how individuals can

play their part in supporting their communities. If you would like to become more involved in the workings of our village please do consider standing as a Parish Councillor as it would be good to have some new ideas particularly when considering a Village Plan.

Many people have told me how much they enjoyed our Fun Dog Show in September. As well as raising around £500 for my Charity of the Year, the Dog's Trust, we all had a great afternoon. I would like to thank everyone who helped to plan and run the day and the hundreds of people and dogs who turned out and entered into the spirit of the event. I smile every time I picture the pair of dogs dressed as bride and groom in the fancy dress class and also when I remember the complete chaos around the biscuit eating competition. The animal companion theme has continued with a charity photographic competition. The 57 entries will be exhibited and prizes awarded on Saturday 20th November.

One of our Councillors, Christine Jefford, has very

kindly agreed to run one of her very challenging quizzes early in 2011 for the Dog's Trust so look out for details of that on our website.

It has been a busy time on The Green with classic car events and fun fairs so I would like to thank our rangers Jamie Marlow and our new addition, Mark Fox, for their hard work and expertise in keeping Croxley special. The Green will be hosting our annual New Year's Eve firework display and as I have seen Christmas decorations in the shops I assume that it can't be that far off!

Fun Dog Show for Chairman's Charity - The Dogs Trust



Stones Orchard, a historic site in Croxley Green for fruit growing, was the location on Saturday 25 September for a fun dog show arranged by Croxley Green Parish Council to raise funds for its Chairman's Charity of the year, the Dog's Trust rehoming centre at Harefield.

Over 300 people accompanied around 150 dogs for an event which awarded prizes for categories such as the dog with the waggiest tail, the best rescue dog, the best six legs, fancy dress and the dog the judge would most like to take home. The judging, by David Gauke MP, Adam Binnie from the Watford Observer and Hazel Seeley, Parish Councillor, identified the best dogs from 12 classes, not easy decisions to make with rivalry running high and dog owners working hard to make sure their dogs reached the required standard.

Marion Birch, Chairman of Croxley Green Parish Council commented "Residents of

Croxley Green are very aware that we are a community of dog owners but I was astounded by the numbers of dogs and their families that participated in this event. It was obvious that everyone, on two legs and four, enjoyed this fund raising dog show and, as well as having a good time, over £500 was raised to help the work of the Dog's Trust."

A proportion of the Parish Council's budget is spent on limiting the impact of man's best friend on the living environment through the supply of dog waste bags and installation/ emptying of 42 dog waste bins around the village which demonstrates its commitment to dog owning in the community. 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
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Wedding Anniversaries

- Peter and Janet Ward of Waterdell House who celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary on 16 September 2010. Their secret? They disagree often but agree on all the important things!
- Mr and Mrs Galashan of Kenilworth Drive have been married for 65 years

However, the longest married couple to notify us were Bill and Joan Merrick of Dulwich Way who have been married for 69 years!

Several couples highlighted some interesting changes in the housing market over the years. Bill and Joan Merrick lived in one of the 80 prefabs on Grove Crescent as did

my uncle Harry Parr. These prefabs were positively luxurious in comparison with most ordinary houses of that date, few of which had inside toilets or bathrooms.

Mr and Mrs Fountaine remember that the house they bought cost the vendors £300, Mr and Mrs Fountaine purchased the house for £1,999 and last year it was on the market for £179,000.

My own father lived in Rickmansworth and worked at the mill, a weekly bus fare to Croxley cost 2 shillings, houses in Valley Walk were £250 and repayments were two shillings and sixpence (2/6); he could not afford the extra sixpence.

I tried to buy a house in Harvey Road for £4,050 but could only raise £4,000 so I lost it for the sake of £50.

I know that all things are relative but have all things changed for the better? (I think not). It is still a fine place in which to live, let us all enjoy and cherish it.

Café-O, St Oswald's Church, Croxley Green

My friend Ida Dutton and myself recently discovered Café-O.

The Café-O is situated in the main body of St. Oswald's Church and has been open on a Monday for the past five years. In term time it is open between 8.30am and 3.30pm and regularly serves 50-75 people. During school holidays, the opening hours are reduced to 8.30am – 12.30pm. When the mother and baby clinic is open in the hall the café is a popular venue for mums with young children.

Café-O caters for adults, in particular mums with young children, as there are toys for the

children to play with. There is an extensive menu with many choices of food including Cuppa soup, rolls, scones and jam and home-made cakes, all at very reasonable prices.

We were most impressed with the food on sale and had to sample (as a matter of duty!) a mug of coffee and a slice of coffee sponge which was delicious!

There is a rota of ten people serving, plus others who go in first thing in the morning to set up the tables and chairs and then later in the day to put it all away again.

Salt Bins


Following a request in the last edition of the Parish Pump for residents' suggestions for locations of new salt bins we had several responses.

The Parish Council was already responsible for a number of salt bins in Croxley and we are pleased to advise that this year an extra six salt bins have been purchased by the Parish Council.

Following this consultation, they will be sited at:

either end of Beechcroft Avenue;
the junction of Frankland Rd and Harvey Rd;
the top of Dorrofield Rd;
near the flats in Sycamore Road
and by the Parish Council depot in Barton Way car park.

Residents are reminded that the salt is not intended for personal use on private land, ie. driveways, but is there to keep the roads, especially at junctions, clear of snow and ice and to improve conditions for everyone.



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Our Environment

Speeding on the Green

If you try to exceed the speed limit on the Green think again. The Community Police for Croxley Green have now been fully trained on the new digital hand held speed camera. It is being deployed with Officers, day or night, randomly on The Green and elsewhere and its range is just awesome! The speed limit across The Green and throughout Croxley Green is 30mph except for New Road where the limit is 20mph.

If you spot the camera, it is probably too late as it's already recorded your speed, captured your number plate and taken your picture – smile, I think not as you're nicked! The new hand held digital camera does an automatic check with DVLC to check road tax and insurance.

Around Croxley Green the Auto Recognition system has been used to great success on those who think they can exceed the speed limit. In doing so they put other lives at risk and this is a message we must all remember.

In New Road the speed limited is 20mph. Around the schools and elsewhere in Croxley Green there are the lampposts which tell the drivers it is a 30mph limit but would you drive past a school at 30mph? At 30mph you would probably kill a child. If that was your child, how would you feel? At 20mph the child may survive, but only may.

There are two zebra crossings in Croxley Green; by the Shell Garage on Watford Road and by the junction of Watford Road and Harvey Road. There have been so many near incidents, if not actual accidents, it is untrue and even the Traffic Control Lady at the Watford Road/Harvey Road zebra crossing has herself suffered with close encounters of the non-stopping car kind. Why? What happened to the Highway Code? Stop on no zone areas for dropping the kids off? I think not. Why can't drivers think?

Only the other day a near incident happened when a car turning right, and indicating to do so, was overtaken by a motorcyclist – lucky for the motorcyclist the car didn't turn. Cyclists are driver so drivers should not just be categorised as car drivers. Car, bicycle, electric bike, moped, car, van, lorry - if it has the capability of speed there is the capability of an accident.

Why is it that drivers today think they rule the road? Think of everyone else on the road and beside it on the pavement.

Observe, keep alert but most of all, THINK!

Croxley Hall Woods – Glades of Tranquillity

Although barely ten minutes walk from All Saints' Church, Croxley Hall Woods are quite unknown to many residents and yet they are a beautiful unspoilt area of mature trees and bluebell woodland, stretching as far as the railway line. The rangers of our Parish Council in collaboration with the woodland management services of Three Rivers District Council and Countryside Management Service have cleared much of the undergrowth and continue to do so each winter; in doing this they have created several beautiful woodland glades suitable for picnics surrounded by the peace and tranquillity of deep woodland habitat. On July 1st, the first new picnic area was opened, thanks to a generous grant – more and more people are now discovering it, with its state of the art picnic furniture. It is just the place to spend lazy summer evenings watching the woodpeckers, jays and roe deer as they go about their business. As evening draws in the Pipistrelle bats appear, swooping and squeaking as they flash past eating insects.

Many thanks to those who helped with this project, especially Parish Councillor Brading and our own rangers who are responsible for its maintenance. Hopefully if this picnic site is successful it will be followed by many others – another jewel in Croxley's crown!!

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


School Gardens Updates

Little Green

Gardening Club has been very productive since we last wrote about what we get up to. In the spring we decided that we would plant some of the same vegetables as last year and try out some new ones. We planted lettuce, radishes, carrots and beetroot that we had grown before and they have been just as successful this year. We took samples home to try them out – the radishes were not very popular but the rest of the produce was. We grew potatoes again but planted them in the deep black plastic sacks this time. They were successful too.

New vegetables we tried were French beans, onions grown from sets and red cabbages. We also planted some flower seeds and courgettes and sold those plants at our summer fair.

We were given some tomato plants and added them to our plot. They seemed to grow and grow and we received many envious comments from other gardeners who visited our School.

Most of the vegetables and spare plants we have grown were sold at our Open Evening at the end of July. The money we raised will be used to buy seeds for next year's crop !

We also planted some pumpkin seeds for the Parish Council Competition and the plants seemed to go wild. They spread all over our vegetable area and even started to climb up the wall of the School. They have produced some good sized pumpkins which we are looking forward to carving into faces at our next meeting. We gave some to two local Harvest Festivals to add to the decorations and we

have been asked for any left over by keen cooks who want to make pumpkin soup and chutney. We hope we will be given some samples to taste !

We have had some surprise plants growing in our plot too – some that we did not plant. Part of our gardening work involves composting any waste we can and we have used the compost we make to feed the plants. When the classes in School do cookery or the children have their snacks, we collect up the waste and put it into our composting bins. We think that somebody must have had watermelon because we found that two watermelons had grown when we came back from the summer holiday. We also had a pepper plant but there were no peppers on it.

Work has also included planting the big flower pots with bright flowers to make School look more attractive. We also try and keep our herb garden under control by pruning, but that is proving to be a much harder job.

We will soon be having our 'winter break' from Gardening Club but we are already thinking about what we would like to try to grow next year and how we can make the School environment better. We'll tell you about what we decided to do next time.

Harvey Road

At the School's Harvest Festival, the Gardening Club showed some of the vegetables we've grown this year. Our produce basket included potatoes, a spaghetti squash, plaits of onions and garlic, runner beans, parsnips and bunches of fragrant herbs. Other notable successes this year were peas, carrots, radishes,

strawberries, blackcurrants and dwarf French beans.

We planted our tomato seedlings into trugs with colourful French marigolds and were rewarded with lots of sweet tasting fruits. For the first time, we grew brassicas producing two cauliflowers and a huge purple sprouting broccoli. The children enjoyed picking and eating the tasty spears straight off the plant. We also had more than 30 Large White Butterfly caterpillars which ate the leaves, got fat and then vanished, all within two weeks!

Not everything was so successful. The Gardening Club and Class 5 harvested their "first early" potatoes in June however the results were very disappointing, perhaps due to frosts in May and a dry June. Our main crop potatoes dug up in September



were better. Our broad bean plants were covered in black fly, although these did provide food for lots of ladybirds and their strange looking black and purple larvae. Sweet corn germinated poorly and the later plants didn't develop proper cobs but we'll definitely try this again next year.

The prolonged hot, dry weather in



June and July made it very difficult to keep the garden sufficiently watered; seedlings struggled to grow into strong plants. When our water butt ran dry we had to carry water from the school buildings. However, we are grateful that Jamie the Ranger has set up a second water butt and the Parish Council have provided us with 75 metres of hose – enough to connect to the nearest outside tap! So we should be able to keep our plants watered and have even better crops for next year's Harvest Festival.

The growing gardens were off to a great start with the initial summer heat. We were very proud of the



variety of produce, and the children were able to harvest strawberries, lettuces, parsley, beetroot, courgettes, spring onions, and peas. We had a few cooking sessions and the children enjoyed their home-grown produce and we were also able to provide the school kitchen with salad items for school dinners.

Then the rain came along with a variety of pests such as fungus and black fly! However, the plants continued to grow well and when the children returned after the summer holidays they harvested some large marrows, runner beans and an abundance of tomatoes. We have had a few delicious apples and blackcurrants, but sadly the peaches succumbed to the wet weather. The Gardening Club has been busy picking the last few crops and clearing the beds ready for a winter mulch. We will have



one more cooking session, and do a few winter jobs such as making bird feeders and nest boxes to encourage the wildlife into the gardens. The gardens will have a few winter sowings such as garlic and leeks, but otherwise we are looking forward to another season after Christmas.

Although it has been a steep learning curve, our successes are 100% down to the enthusiasm of the children.

A look at some of Croxley's oldest Houses

After writing a series of articles in the Parish Pump about trees on The Green, I thought I would write about some of the older houses and buildings in Croxley which may be unknown to many residents.

Waterdell House

This is a large family home located at Little Green, in Little Green Lane. It has been owned by Peter and Janet Ward since 1953, where they have raised their family of 8 children.

It began as a modest house and appears on a map of the area dated 1766. The original thick outer walls are now interior walls, where the house has been extended over time, becoming a large house by the Victorian era. Originally it had a chapel opposite, located in the area which is now a small wood. At one

time, the extensions to the house included incorporating 2 windows from the chapel into the western side of the house. It would also



appear that another pair of windows, or perhaps the chapel door, were used as the new front door of Waterdell House which can be seen on the roadside today. Little Green Lane was the main road through to Watford and so the chapel would have been in an ideal position. I do not know when this chapel was demolished or fell into disrepair, but there is certainly no

sign of it now. Janet remembers that, when her children were small, she filled in a very large hole in the wood, probably left behind from the days of the chapel, to stop the children falling into it as they played there.

Waterdell House was owned by Mr. Woolrych (who also owned Croxley House) until April 1921, when it was sold to the Forbes family. It was requisitioned by the National Fire Service (NFS) during the Second World War who used it as a dormitory for the firemen. A bomb-proof telephone exchange was built in the grounds and there still remain a huge number of telephone cables beneath the floor around the house. Women based there during this time told of the times they would look out of the upper windows of the telephone exchange, across the wall surrounding what is now the field behind Croxley House, where they would wave to the American

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soldiers based there!

In May 1945 it was sold to a Mr. Bagshawe who occupied the entire property until June 1949 when it was advertised as one house for the last time. This advert included a

cottage and paddocks (later to become Coachman's cottage) as well as the main house. It appears that it was sold to developers who split the property into the 3 existing properties: Waterdell House, Little Waterdell House and the separate Coachman's Cottage.



Waterdell House was bought in 1950 by 'Foot and Lines', the 'Foot' being the brother of Michael Foot, who then sold it again in 1953 to Janet and Peter Ward, the present owners. Having looked at many properties in London and the surrounding area they almost didn't look at this house, but the fact that

the advert said that it was part of one house which had been split into 2 caught their eye. Janet says that the hallway was what really sold it to her, a real welcoming part of the house, as well as the house having a feeling of spirituality. Little has been done to the house in the 57 years in which they have lived there, still retaining many of the features of the original house. If you look at the outside of the house it is clear which bits have been



added, and the windows on the east and west side are slightly different.

When they moved in to the house, the extensive garden was very overgrown. Janet knew nothing about gardening but was to learn an enormous amount from her gardener, Mr. Bradley. This knowledge has enabled Janet to have a beautiful rear garden, with fine trees, a topiary holly hedge and



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herbaceous borders. As a child, living across the road, I remember spending hours playing in the gardens and picking numerous raspberries from the fruit cages during the summer.

The garden is still evolving today, with sculptures being added, a secluded pond area, pathways through the trees and a wooden fort which Janet has built for her grandchildren to enjoy, with views over the fields of Redheath. There are two very large oak trees: one which is probably well over 200 years old; and a second, a sapling from the first, which Janet retained when she cleared the garden shortly after they moved to the house. Each year, at the end of June, the gardens are open as part of the National Gardens Scheme and are well worth a visit, they are stunning! The date for next year is Sunday 26th June so put it in your



diary: enjoy tea and cake, buy plants for your garden and explore this hidden gem on the outskirts of Croxley!
