The Council Tax has shown that local responsibilities are costly. Traditionally works to playing fields, woods and open spaces were part of the general rate levied by the District, but now they appear as special expenses and are shown as being levied for the particular parish. We believe that we can perform functions. due to local knowledge and involvement, more efficiently than from a central source however well meaning and conscientious. We believe that our management of the Green demonstrates this fact. Where our fellow Parish Councils run these aspects of local government, it is evident that there is local accountability and value for money.

We want you to take part in our considerations for the local community and with the opening of the Parish Office we hope to hear from you and your concerns.

The Parish Council is here to stay and will only become irrelevant if you do not take an interest. Support us and we will endeavour to support you. It is your Council - make it work for you.

PARISH OFFICE

On a fortunately dry day, Friday 2nd April, the prefabricated building was delivered, in two halves, to its site adjacent to the Community Centre. As you can imagine it caused some interest in Barton Way and the news will have travelled fast.



It is important that this office is seen by the Community as a source of information and it will be open each weekday morning, when complete, between the hours of 10.00am and 2.00pm.

Until then the Clerk will continue to operate from his home which, with the Council becoming more active, is becoming an unacceptable imposition. The office, though impressive, is of modest size and cost. It will prove much cheaper than renting accommodation and will not only house the Council's administration and meetings but should be available for use as a committee room for a variety of local organisations, which presently find it difficult to find premises.

We would urge you to use the office for communicating your concerns and contacting your representatives. It is your office and is there to serve you.

ENVIRONMENT AND AMENITY COMMITTEE



During the forthcoming year we are aiming to initiate many schemes that will make Croxley Green an even more pleasant place in which to live.

This will start with the Annual Clean-up Days on April 17th and 18th. In the mean-time help us by being aware of and using the Dog-bins in our playing fields. It makes sense.

The results of the poster competition for our anti-litter campaign are set out elsewhere. The winning designs will be displayed around the Parish and hopefully, weather permitting, a display from each school will be shown on Revels Day, June 19th.

The Garden Competition (see Entry Form) is to take place during the summer and we are looking forward to a 'blooming' display from as many residents etc. who will join in.

We have continued down Scots Hill, planting more daffodils and this spring should see the first showing of daffodils in front of Baldwins Lane recreation ground.

Open Spaces

These are important areas for the community of Croxley Green and its visitors to enjoy shared activities that enable groups of all ages to come together. Others can provide places for quiet contemplation or a refuge for wild life.

One particular area - Stone's Orchard, just off the Green - is such a place. Recently we provided 25 Cherry trees that have been planted, staked and protected which we feel will bring much pleasure in the future for our community who use this area for either walks or to picnic?

Last autumn the Green was thoroughly inspected and we have become aware of nettles and brambles around the perimeter, encroaching onto the grassed area. As this is one of our important recreational areas, in which our community can pursue leisure interests, we have started a maintenance programme beginning with the removal of these to restore the boundary line. Further inspections will take place during the summer.

Parish Paths

We are examining the possibilities of joining a new scheme, called the Parish Paths Partnership initiated by the Countryside Commission, whereby practical assistance is given to maintain footpaths such as those leading to the Chess or through Croxley Hall Woods. Committee members have undertaken to walk all of our parish paths to report on their condition.

Community Security

It has been constantly reported how Croxley Green has been a target area for criminal activities and this has been of much concern to us. We are actively cooperating with PC Bob Cobey, our Community Policeman, and the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme to revitalise the awareness of our need to be more vigilant and security minded.

The scheme relies on the help and goodwill of volunteers - co-ordinators and stewards - to distribute copies of the Watch Bulletin (issued by Watford Police Station) to households. Unfortunately, owing to financial restraints and time to distribute, the scheme also relies on the copies being passed on from one household to another. Many households, for various reasons, are not seeing a copy of this monthly communique. If you do not see a copy and would like to assist in the scheme (not an onerous task) or would like any other information concerning your particular road, please ring Derek Thompson on 778979.

We are hoping to encourage the residents who are part of the scheme and receive the monthly copy of *The Watch* to pass on this copy to their neighbours as many, at present, do not.


Look out for the co-operation of Neighbourhood Watch, Police and the Parish Council at this year's Revels, where a display and information area will be available for your questions.

THE COMMUNITY BUS



Those readers who use the Friday Bus Service will know that the Council has increased the fare to 60p. However this still remains very good value for money. There is a limit to the funds available to subsidise special services and it is anticipated that other calls will be made on similar funds in the future.

At the time of writing this article it is evident that at least one run each Friday is being oversubscribed and so the Council has grasped the nettle and decided to make an extra run each Friday morning.

In the meantime, there may be occasions when, due to overdemand, there could be some delay whilst a further run is organised. In these circumstances we would ask you to be patient, the delay will be no more than half-an-hour. Remember, this transport service provides almost a door-to-door service. It never runs early and only occasionally late and then only by a matter of a few minutes.



PUBLICITY COMMITTEE



The publicity Committee was set up some 15 months ago with the main aim of producing the *Parish Pump*, the first edition of which was produced in February 1992. As well as using this medium, the committee is responible for communicating, in other ways, the work and aims of the Parish Council on behalf of the community.

Currently our activities include the creation of a Village Map for Croxley Green which was reported in the last edition of the Parish Pump and also in The Resident. Work is proceeding but we have many and varied ideas that need to be reduced to manageable size in order to get a good cross-section of people's favourite things on the map. In the time honoured way progress is somewhat slower than anticipated, however, enthusiasm and commitment undiminished and we will keep you informed.

One of the 'spin-offs' from the map could be the production of booklets concerning

Croxley Green's local history and landmarks; walks through the village; footpaths and rights-of-way. We will be considering these possibilities later in the year.

We are also making plans for the Revels on June 19th. We hope to have a display which will reflect the Parish Council's work generally, show progress on the Village Map and provide space for photographic competitions with some modest prizes to add interest.

Once we have our Parish Office operational, we will have much more scope for display material on an on-going basis. We are conscious of the need to keep the community informed of the Council's work and as well as putting Croxley Green on the map we shall be endeavouring to improve the broad process of communications.


TOWNS AND OUR VILLAGE
