## Road Safety in Croxley Green

As the Parish Council representative, and chairman, of the Croxley Green Road Safety Committee I thought I would give you an update of our work over the last few months. Roads are on most people's complaint list for one reason or another and we have listened to concerns which have come to us and acted wherever possible.

We instigated, with the help of PCSO Jamie Hornett, new 15mph speed signs in Community Way and the adjacent car park following concerns from a resident about speeding and the safety of pedestrians, in particular children, using that area. Thank you to TRDC for getting those signs installed quickly. As a committee we have also designed leaflets and posters which you should have seen in shops and organisations in the area around this car park. Please adhere to this speed limit for everyone's safety.

Another ongoing concern has been the zebra crossings in Watford Road. Thanks to money from developers these are in the process of being upgraded to Puffin crossings as I write. Local councillors acted on concerns from local residents and, thanks to Cllr Chris Lloyd in particular, a site meeting was arranged which included many local district (continued on page 5......)

councillors, County Cllr Steve Drury and myself (representing the Road Safety Committee and Parish Council) meeting with representatives from Herts County Council Highways and Road Safety departments. We were able to voice the concerns of Croxley residents, particularly about the width of the road at the point of the crossing. Fortunately for us, although the road was quiet, several of the bad practices we were worried about were beautifully demonstrated for us! As a result of this meeting several changes were made to the plans for the crossing; most importantly the road is being widened so that cars coming from Watford should be able to pass motorists waiting to turn right into the petrol station safely on the road rather than mounting the kerb or driving on the pavement as has so often been seen. This should keep traffic flowing and ease congestion. It did mean a slight delay in installing the puffin crossing but only 2 weeks: we felt it was better to wait a bit longer but get the best and safest possible solution to this very tricky area.

The crossing by Harvey Road has taken several weeks longer than anticipated and I am unaware of the reasons (I have my own ideas!). I did contact the Highways dept. raising my concerns for the safety of the parents and children who use this crossing now that schools have returned (as well as other pedestrians), as there was now no crossing at all for them to use and Iollipop ladies were taking their lives in their hands to do their job. I noticed that a mobile crossing appeared the next day! It does pay to make those phone calls!

One other problem which comes up at every meeting is speeding along The Green. I have been in contact with Herts Highways requesting new signs and/or road markings to remind drivers that the speed limit is **30pmh** along **the full stretch of The Green**. It sounds very hopeful that we will get these, especially as similar measures have been put in place on Sarratt Green.

A new campaign for the autumn/ winter is trying to keep cyclists of all ages safe on our roads. If you are on your bike please remember to wear bright clothing, have your lights on and follow the rules of the road; **let drivers see you!** If you are in a car/van/lorry look out for cyclists and give them space. Please look out for more information about this but we are grateful to the local schools for their participation.

## Croxley Green's First Wassail Ceremony (as far as we know!)

When: January 17 2012

Where: Stone's Orchard

Time: 6.30pm to 8.00pm with formalities commencing at 7:00pm

Why are we doing it? - We have an orchard and Wassailing the fruit trees is an old custom although mainly found in the West Country. So, why have one in Croxley Green? Well, we seem to be very short on local tradition and ceremony, we have an orchard, the organiser of the event was born in Herefordshire and it will be a fun evening in a dreary month!

Who will be there? - It is all very much in the planning stage but we have invited at least one Morris Side, Folk Musicians and our very own Croxley Mummers. We hope, therefore, to have dancing, singing, playing and Mumming and, most importantly, YOU!!!

What is the purpose? – to encourage the trees in the orchard to have a good year and produce lots of fruit (this is particularly important in cider counties!).

What will happen? - Well, we are still at the planning stage but we hope to start with some Morris Dancing, have some music and then some "Mumming." This will be followed by the Wassail incantation which will go something like: "Here's to thee, old apple tree, that blooms well, bears well. Hats full, caps full, three bushel bags full, an' all under one tree." Then pieces of bread, soaked in cider, will be placed into the branches of one tree and the remaining cider poured around the roots. Then we will all make as much noise as we possibly can (but only for a minute). Then there will be some more music and the ceremony ends with more dancing in which everyone can join in. There is no set ceremony as what happens varies from place to place but the incantation and the cider soaked bread is very much general to all. Perhaps we can devise something unique to Croxley Green!

Why come? – It will be fun, it will be something to do in the middle of January, it will start a new Croxley Green tradition and it will help make money for the Parish Council charities; the Peace Hospice and the Sunnyside Club (there will be a collection during and when leaving). Ellie and Dan at The Sportsman pub have kindly reserved The Shed for us so we hope to continue with some singing and playing afterwards and toast Croxley Green's first Wassail!

Being Jubilee Year meant our colour scheme had to be red, white and blue of course. "Petunias" they said and these were duly purchased. We also had some geraniums given to us from Councillor Leighton Dann, which saved us quite a bit of money.

this summer. Firstly, we were fortunate to receive a grant from County Councillor Steve Drury which enabled us to buy and plant 8 more barrels outside the shops opposite the Red House pub. Secondly, in partnership with London Underground, we planted up new troughs and baskets outside the newly painted Croxley Station. We hope that those of you who use the station have enjoyed the lovely displays.



The last two weeks in May were feverish as everything had to be planted before the Jubilee. This could not have happened without the hard work and enthusiasm of everyone concerned. The 4 beds in Watford Road along with 10 new barrels all had to be finished. A watering rota was agreed on but as you all know; came the Jubilee, came the rain (and wind), weeks of it! This led to slimy petunias, waterlogged barrels (which had to be pierced to get rid of the water), hours of deadheading and pruning rotting roses outside the library. Next year no more petunias!

Everything has perked up during August now that we have had some sunshine and, at the moment, everything looks bright and colourful. Thank you to all the shopkeepers who watered the barrels (when needed). Flowers 4 Croxley do appreciate the help we get. We receive no financial help from the Parish Council; however

we do have the assistance of the Parish Council's Rangers - Jamie Marlow and Mark Fox. Thanks, too, to Amanda Taft in the office who helps in so many different ways.

We hope that you have all enjoyed the flowers around the village during this soggy summer and we now look forward to planting for the winter months.

#### The Long Wet Summer

As I write the rain is bucketing down and it is the middle of July what an unusually damp summer it has been!

Let's look on the bright side however - the 'Flowers for Croxley' areas have never looked lovelier and what a beautiful display there has been all over the village - a lot of hard work has gone into this and the rain has done the rest.

The Green has really deserved its name as an emerald oasis, keeping some of the grass long is a wonderful idea and has encouraged some rare plants and flowers to grow in profusion such as Harebell, Ladies Bedstraw, Ragged Robin and many others. There have also been some unusual insects such as glow worm, stag beetles and Cinnabar moths and although bird life has generally suffered this nesting season, a couple of Little Owls nested in the big oak tree on The Green opposite Whitegates. The owls are unusual as they are not nocturnal and can often be seen sitting on telephone lines in day time. Foxes are everywhere in Croxley these days - and they are so tame they stand and watch you as you walk into your garden, probably expecting you to throw them a chicken leg - badgers have also increased as the state of my garden fence shows! They are incredibly strong and apart (continued overleaf .....)

from putting up a brick wall, they will move any obstacle in their path as they search for worms.

The really good news is that most people have stopped putting out toxic blue slug pellets which have killed off so many hedgehogs and thrushes and are using the harmless green ones. This has been a summer not for the birds and the bees but for the slugs and the snails - they are everywhere, loving the rain. I have picked up several small buckets of them during the season - if I were in France I could sell them but I prefer to tip them into a tank of salt water.

'Keep Croxley Green' has been our slogan for years - this year, despite rain sodden barbecues, we know what this slogan really means.

#### The Community Plan

As most of you will know there is a team of people, all volunteers. from both the Parish Council and the CGRA who are working towards creating a Community Plan (CP). The Parish Council will also produce a Neighbourhood Plan (NP) at the same time. The NP is a document that has some real teeth under the new Localism Act which came into place last November. Both plans work together, there will be a lot in common and they will compliment each other. The CP will cover many topics and will be a blueprint of how we want to see Croxley Green in the future. The NP will deal mainly with planning issues, and help identify what we must safeguard and how we want the village to progress and develop in a sustainable way. At a later stage, we may put the NP to a referendum and, if it is agreed, it will have statutory powers working with the TRDC local plan.

The first step for both of these plans is to put out a questionnaire to all the residents of Croxley Green. This is to get **your views** on a wide range of issues, the results of which will provide a lot of the information that will go into both plans.

The questionnaire is virtually ready to send to all of you, and a copy will be sent to each household later this autumn. We urge you all to complete the questionnaire **online**, and full details of how to do this will come to you at the same time. This will make it a lot easier to assimilate the answers and analyse them. We are using a programme called 'Survey Monkey', which is well known and very useful when we hope to get up to 12,000 replies!!!

It is very important that you all complete the questionnaire, so your voice is heard to help put together both plans for the future of our wonderful village. Please look out for the questionnaire later on and then complete it online. Thank you very much.

#### Safe Pavements for Pedestrians

I first wrote an article on this subject 2 years ago but this problem continues to get worse. So I have altered it a little and make no apologies for addressing the issue again in the hope that, on reading it now, it makes some people take a little more care.

It has again been brought to my attention by several people in New Road that there is an enormous problem of cars mounting the kerb and driving along the pavement when passing oncoming vehicles.

I have witnessed this many times myself. I have 2 young children who either walk along the

pavement with me, or may ride their scooters, and it amazes me the number of 'close shaves' we have had! The worst area that I am aware of is in New Road between the library and the station where there are cars parked on one side of the road. Instead of waiting to pass these when there is adequate time and space, drivers pull round, reducing the space for the traffic in the opposite direction, which in turn leads many of the drivers of these vehicles to mount the pavement, because, of course, they can't wait to let them pass! The huge number of dropped kerbs along this stretch makes this an attractive option for car drivers, however this is not the purpose of a dropped kerb! (They also make the life of the pedestrian very difficult!)

Please, think of the safety of pedestrians when you drive along our roads, especially for our children who may be less visible and road-aware than adults. Take a little more time to let other cars through when space is limited; a moment or two of your time could save a life!

Please remember: the road is for motor vehicles, the pavement **should** be a safe place for pedestrians!

# War Horse - Update

# Croxley's War Horse; The Final Chapter

Following my article in the last edition of The Parish Pump regarding Croxley Green's connection with "War Horse" I have been asked by several people what eventually became of the cavalry horses who served on the battlefields of World War I.

The disposal of these animals was to become a shameful episode for Britain and the War Office.

There is no record as to the exact number of horses sent to the battlefields of France and Belgium from this country. Numbers vary from regiment to regiment against so called official War Office records.

My article related to the Scots Greys (they became Royal Scots Greys in 1877, their official title being 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons (Royal Scots Greys).

From the Cavalry Corps war diary, the following figures regarding the Scots Greys are shown:

1<sup>st</sup> Cav Division - 31 horses killed, 55 died from illness and wounds and 55 destroyed;

2<sup>nd</sup> Cav Division - 273 killed, 154 died of illness and wounds and 37 destroyed and from the 3<sup>rd</sup> Cav division - 563 killed, 18 died of illness and wounds and 24 destroyed - a total of 1,210.

From other regimental records we know that the Scots Greys after almost five years of service on the continent returned home on 21 March 1919 via Southampton with a total number of 133 horses. The horses were allowed to return to their natural colour grey.

Cllr Frank Brand Cllr Janet Martin Cllr Hazel Seeley Cllr Wendy Shafe Cllr David Wynne-Jones David Allison (Clerk) Amanda Taft Large amounts of equine stock were auctioned off in the Benelux countries (as portrayed in Steven Spielberg's "War Horse"). From accounts most ended up on butchers slabs. The War Office in London maintained it would be too costly to bring all the horses home. This short-sightedness caused a severe crisis on the farms of Britain during the early 1920's.

On the Middle East front of World War I where the Australian Light Horse served fighting "Johnny Turk" the horses fared slightly better.

At the war's end, the Light Horsemen were told quarantine regulations could not be relaxed in Australia for their horses. They could not be repatriated and were to be sold locally.

However, the men witnessed daily mistreatment of animals throughout the region and a massive protest swept through the ranks. The Australian Army compromised: those horses fit and young enough would be given to Indian cavalry regiments and the rest would be shot.

The rejects were picketed in olive groves at Tripoli, Syria, given a last nosebag and shot by special squads of marksmen. They were shorn of manes and tails for saleable horse hair, their shoes were salvaged and their skins were cured and sold.

I have in my possession a photograph taken in Palestine in 1917 by Frank Hurley, Australian showing 4 Regiments of 2<sup>nd</sup> Brigade Australian Light Horse. It is absolutely amazing. There are mounted horses as far as the eye can see; over 4000 horsemen!

The end of World War I was the beginning of the end for the cavalry, both in Europe and the United States. Mechanisation was taking over.

In 1931, General Douglas MacArthur, then Army Chief of Staff, issued an order that US cavalry regiments were to become mechanised and cavalry remount horses were to be destroyed.

An agreement was reached with the Mexican Government to slaughter the horses. Batches of 400-500 horses were driven over the border to be shot in Mexican lime pits.

Lt Marshall Buxton and Sgt John Libby with three troopers took 400 remounts to Mexico but when they saw the slaughter they decided there and then to save their horses. What followed was an amazing story. They drove the horses from the lime pits of Mexico, through the United States and over the Canadian border. The horses were then handed over to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Buxton and Libby were courtmarshalled and imprisoned in Fort Leavenworth. They were eventually pardoned by President Reagan.

The last active engagement by Horse Cavalry was in January 1941 at Bataan, Manila by the US 26<sup>th</sup> Cavalry against the Japanese.

On 15 March 1942 the last horses (250) of a regular US army unit met their end.

What a way to treat our 'noble' friend!
