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FROM THE CHAIRMAN

I suspect that the Parish Pump is now becoming as popular as the Resident though the distribution is not done by volunteers and therefore does not reach all our constituents, where they bar the delivery of free newspapers, which is the most reliable medium we can find. However it is your way of keeping in touch with the activities of your elected local representatives.

This edition we have decided to concentrate on the cause of local traders, which keep our village alive. Yes! Cllr. Sheila Wright's article surprised me with its findings but it was a pleasant surprise. I am one of those old-fashioned bodies that regret the passing of the true village grocer who found out the items that one required on demand. I am always lost in supermarkets and do not enjoy serving myself, my ignorance of weights, measures and use of items needs help. I find that local shopkeepers are willing to help in this manner and I don't have to spend precious time looking around countless shelves. Clir. Brian Norman's article on local entrepreneurs looks interesting and perhaps will fire a newly redundant but enterprising person to research more fully this interesting prospect.

The article concerning our proposals for the protection of the Green from its annual invasion deserves your careful consideration. We are willing - are you?

This edition also shows, contrary to some opinion, that we care about and are working in other areas than the Green. Yes, I know that we have recently renewed the surround to the War Memorial but we have also constructed a much needed footpath in Little Green Lane to protect our younger citizens. Work is also proceeding to protect and improve our heritage of country footpaths.

We do care, will you help us. Our door is always open. Well between 10.00am and 2.00pm every weekday.

PARISH COUNCILS COST LESS

A number of people have said, very pointedly, that our Parish Council is a waste of money and that they get nothing for the Council Charge that they pay. It is, therefore, time that the facts were made clear.

Look again at your Council Charge demand. It is clear that the charges, in total, show that the un-parished area is the most expensive and that parished areas are cheaper, depending on the length of establishment and the services covered. The basic rate covering Hertfordshire County Council and Three Rivers District Council are the same throughout the area and amount to (on a band D property):-

Herts CC £450.77
Herts Police Authority 46.02
TRDC -General expenses 72.81
TOTAL £569.60

The rest of the bill is made up of charges specific to each area. These consist of Special Expenses and Parish Precepts. The totals vary from area to area but observation shows that these are greatest in the un-parished area and lowest in the parishes which do most under their own management. These are laid out below for our Parish with companisons (in brackets) for last year:-

 Special expenses
 £ 5.98 (£22.01)

 Precept
 £29.35 (£19.30)

 TOTAL
 £35.33 (£41.31)

This gives a grand total of £604 93 (for a band D property) and shows a saving of £5.98 per household. Then compare this with the Grand Total (Band D property) for the un-parished area which is £620.40.

But how have we achieved this? We have been anxious, for some time, to take over the management and expenses of maintaining our playing fields. Examination shows that those parishes which already do this for themselves show savings and we want the people of Croxley Green to share the same advantages. We have now taken the first step and have persuaded TRDC to let us take over the expenses and pay, from our precept, for the management of the playing fields. The figure is removed from Special Expenses and a revised figure is now covered by our normal Parish Precept. We can show savings like this on pure administration and are convinced that, if we can actually carry out the work with our own labour force, we can save even more

We are not criticising the work done by TRDC but feel that, as we are on the spot, we can do as good, if not better, a job. Only time and the chance will tell. Parish Councils are worth while, check your facts and see for yourself - look at the extra services you get from our Rangers - at no extra cost.

LITTLE GREEN LANE

Before I became a Governor at Little Green School, I put in a petition to Three Rivers District Council, on behalf of parents who used Little Green Lane to get their children to school, to make up a footpath. Mrs Mary Tither, a teacher at the school and also a District Councillor, took on the task of trying to persuade TRDC to fund such a footway in the following year's budget. She could see the problems, threatening at the time, of extra traffic coming off the new M25 Motorway and using Rousebarn Lane to get to places within Croxley Green. Since the closing of this lane, it has been so much better.

As you are aware, things at Council level sometimes take years to achieve. I became a governor myself and we all, on the governing body, pulled together to get this pathway started. It eventually got started whilst my daughter was at the school, about five years ago, but - to our disappointment - stopped at Durrants Drive, due to lack of funds.

Last year, I became a Parish Councillor and, together with Vivienne Simister, put pressure on TRDC to finish the job - all to no avail. We then suggested to the

Parish Council that perhaps we could do it ourselves, if it didn't cost too much. It was costed with TRDC's Works Department and they offered to do it for us if we paid them £10,500. Using our own labour, we found that we could do the basic job for about £2000 and eventually after some delay, due to lack of labour, the job has recently been completed by our Rangers, Byron De'Ath and Garry Morris-Jones, leaving the final tarmacadam finish to be laid by TRDC and then adopted (hopefully in the not too distant future). We are indebted to TRDC for the supply of the hoggin, which is the base for the tarmac, and makes the path usable pending this final topping. The path, which has been built to the statutory specification, was officially opened on Monday 29th April, by our own Chairman, and immediately used by representative schoolchildren and the headmaster of Little Green School. An important occasion.

I hope that this project will prove to be worth the fight, in keeping our community safe from the traffic using the lane as a through route.

TRAVELLERS AND THE GREEN

The season of the traveller is imminent and Croxley Green could be in for its, now, annual visitation.

With the change in law, in respect of travellers, they may now reside in our vicinity for longer periods of time. Proposals to try to secure the Green against another invasion have been put forward to the Parish Council, by it's own working party, and your support is now needed to make provision to deter the travellers from camping on the main area of the Green. There is currently little easy access, due to the height of the verges, and it is proposed to extend these bunds with limited small accesses guarded by minor barriers. It is appreciated that there is no finite solution which will prevent access by the most determined but, on the other hand, no deterrent is an open invitation to use our Green as in previous years, leaving us with the cost of making the Green clean and safe after their departure.

As residents of Croxley Green we can help by NOT encouraging these people in giving them work in the form of illicit tree pruning or making up driveways. Remember, you pay the cost twice, once by paying for the service of the task done and, secondly, by the indirect payment of cleaning up - via your Council Tax.

It is your opinion that counts! So, please make your Parish Council aware of your feelings on this subject by writing to them c/o the Parish Office. Or, call in and see the detailed proposals. No final decision will be made until consultation has taken place, but we cannot canvass everyone individually.

LOCAL SHOPKEEPERS

The plight of an ever decreasing market share of our village shops against multiples, must be of great concern to all residents in Croxley.

This sorry state of affairs is wide spread throughout our village communities. To this end a business man living in a Sussex Village decided to research the problem. After carrying out a market research within the community he found there was a need in the market place for re-establishing the personalised delivery service, with the aid of modern technology. With the cooperation of local shop keepers he established a master catalogue of their products; these were then coded for ease of communication. The customer would communicate either by telephone. fax or by updating a previous order. when delivered, by listing the codes of the products required. The products were then purchased on the customers behalf from the selected stores and one single delivery made. The cost to the consumer for this service is £2.99 per delivery. The balance of the expenses in organising the business was derived from agreed discounts from the retailer to the delivery service company.

It was found that the service has been beneficial to the shopkeepers by promoting more trade and by making consumers more aware of the benefits of such a scheme. During interviews with local residents, it was found that it was not only beneficial to the elderly or those that were housebound, but many business people working from home were able to discard the pressure of shopping in large stores. One other interesting comment was made, that they were able to purchase only those goods that they required. Therefore not being coerced into buying unscheduled products, this being a direct cost saving.

This news item was documented by BBC radio in March 1996. So if local retailers feel that there may be grounds for a similar idea in Croxley, one then asks if there is any person willing to organise and put into action such a scheme.

WHY SHOP LOCALLY?

In the last few days I have had a tremendous surprise.

I have always been a great believer in shopping locally, if only because I can see a day coming - though I think it's still a long way off - when I shall not be able to drive and shall certainly not want to toil into Watford on the bus and stand in a queue with all my shopping afterwards. I want to be quite sure that when that day comes I shall have local shops available just round the corner.

So when the Parish Council decided to organise a promotion for local shops, I proposed to do a little "comparison shopping" - taking an average sort of shopping list and seeing exactly what it would cost at a big supermarket and what it would cost in Croxley. What I expected to find was that the supermarket would prove somewhat cheaper, but that this saving would virtually disappear if one considered the costs of getting to the supermarket by car or bus.

But to my absolute astonishment I found that, for my "average" shopping list, this "saving" simply did not exist. There was actually no saving to be made by going to the supermarket - what would have cost £29.48 at Croxley shops would have cost £31.65 there. My shopping list (selected simply as ordinary and normal) would have cost more at -well, I'd better not lay the Parish Council open to a libel suit by naming them, but you know who I mean.

I have never been so surprised in my life, but it was true. I did all my sums as honestly as I could, and tried very hard to compare like with like (not always easy, what with the beef scare and the effects of winter weather on vegetables) and there was no doubt - it is actually cheaper to shop in Croxley.

So why don't we? Because "one-stop shopping" saves time? But personally I always find I waste more time at a supermarket looking for what I want, and then standing in the checkout queue, than ever I do in the small friendly shops of Croxley. Because we are fascinated by the variety of exotic foods on offer? Yes, I can admit that; but must also recognise that the big retailers are adept at seducing me into buying all kinds of things I don't really want, can't really afford, and often don't really enjoy when I've got them.

In any case, I still come back to my original reason for using Croxley shops. One day I shall depend on them for my every day need. If I don't use them now, they may not be there when that day comes. And then what shall I do?



MEMORIES OF CROXLEY GREEN

Croxley Green has changed considerably in the past 150 years since John Dickinson first decided to build one of his many paper mills in the area.

What was a small village, mainly settled around Scots Hill with a scattering of farms and country houses became the Croxley Green we now know.

There are several families still living in Croxley Green who remember many of these changes, their memories of how life used to be are important when we wish to record local history for the future residents of Croxley Green, who will be interested in learning about the history of the place in which they live.

Local history is about the memories and the relationship between people and the places that are important to them.

It is about the common place, the <u>local</u> character that many people can take for granted.

This local distinctiveness is about childhood memories and reminiscences. You may be nine or 90 and these can be lost and forgotten.

Story telling is an ancient art - a lively way of keeping local knowledge alive.

It was a tradition to pass on and remember the locality. Local places are a mixed bag of nature, history, legends and lives and are changing all the time. The smallest things can delight us and take us into another world that we can share with others. Local places mean a great deal to us, whether it is about events that take place on The Green, our school days, the time we spent at the Mill or the Institute or more recent events.

These things can be hard to create and easy to lose.

These "Memories of Croxley Green" are being collected and with photographs will be collated in a book.

If you would like to help:

Jot a few things down - make a list of the things you remember and you are half way there. Looking at old photographs - recalling people who were important to us - events and places.

For some weeks now the LIBRARY has been most generous in giving space to this project in the foyer with a display of photographs many loaned that have been copied. They can be as small as $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ ", they can be enlarged.

STREET TREES

The Ranger has been replacing trees in sites on the road verges that have not had a tree for some time. This may be due to vandalism or removal due to age, where mature tree roots may have lifted the paving or tarmac.

If you have one of these new trees close by <u>PLEASE</u> help it during its early years by sparing some time "once a week" to water the roots

THE POND AT LITTLE GREEN

What has been done so far?

September/October 1994 the pond was dug out with many trailer loads of silt being removed (approximately 22).

Prior to this volunteers/school children had spent a day clearing scrub and grass from the area. Four willow trees were moved from within the pond area that had grown up over many years when the pond had not had any management. Early, heavy rainfall that Autumn (1994) prevented any further work and it was recommended to leave the pond during 1995 and monitor water levels through until summer 1996.

Photographs and measurements have been recorded since then. The Council recommended a report be prepared by an Environmental Consultant who would advise/recommend the best way forward to manage the pond so that it will bring both visual pleasure and educational enjoyment to old and young residents.

When this report is received it will be available at the Parish Office for inspection and hopefully the recommendations can be carried out during the time when the pond is without water during the summer.

If we are to see this pond remain attractive, future management proposals are important otherwise within a short period the pond will revert to the "swampy grass hollow" that it had been in the past years.

WOODLAND MANAGEMENT CROXLEY HALL WOODS

In January of this year the Parish Council, Three Rivers District Council and the Countryside Management Services together, made a start on clearing an area at the bottom of All Saints Lane/corner of Lavrock Lane of Sycamore trees that are beginning to take over these woods. This species readily spreads and can become a "weed" to a woodland, cutting out light and preventing beech, oak and native trees etc from becoming established, as well as the bluebells that are so beautiful here in the spring.

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STONES ORCHARD

(Tree Planting, Vandalism, Coppicing)

Once again our local school children aged from four to eleven years helped to plant fruit trees in the old orchard earlier this year in February. Twelve trees including, apple, cherry and plum were planted by Harvey Road, Little Green, Malvern Way, Yorke Mead and Rickmansworth Park (as many Croxley Green children attend this school).

Each school was photographed and presented with a certificate to remember the occasion and most recently each school was given a photograph to commemorate their morning planting the trees.

Only one month later, sadly some of these and some of the trees planted during March 1995 were severely uprooted - plus the stakes and watering systems and strewn about the orchard. Several trees were snapped in half or bent over. Hopefully many will survive, having been replanted and in some cases taped where they had been bent just in case they will "knit" back together.

If you know any details about this event please let us know or if you regularly walk the orchard perhaps you will report any incidents to the Parish Office.

These tree planting days involving a large number of our younger children, take considerable planning and have been enjoyed by those that have taken part in this restoration of one of the few remaining orchards in Croxley Green. More and more local authorities are beginning to recognise the importance orchards are to a community, for wild life and places to enjoy and experience.

Coppicing in Stones Orchard

Whilst the orchard was primarily known for its fruit trees, at the front there was once a thick hazel "wood" whereby filbert nuts were harvested each year.

These trees would have been regularly coppiced on rotation. Four rows of trees with approximately 10 Hazel Trees per row would have produced a viable harvest which was sold as was the fruit. (primroses once grew amongst these trees).

Why Coppice?

These trees have been unmanaged for many years (in 1960 the tenancy was relinquished by the Stone family).

Periodic coppicing (cutting back) prolongs the life of a tree, allowing the tree to regrow from the cut stumps (stools) this encourages and produces numerous shoots or poles rather than one main stem. Coppiced wood would have been used for traditional building, fencing material and for firewood (faggots). A supply of young shoots would also have been used to create new hedging.

Unmanaged coppiced hazel will eventually grow into trees, that can become top heavy and will in time naturally fall with age or blow over in strong winds.

Three of the four rows were coppiced in February and the gaps planted with "whips". These will be "left alone" to root and the coppiced trees to regrow, the outside row will be left for five years when this too will be coppiced to encourage new growth and prolong the life of this hedge.
